A SOLDIER KILLED.—David Hummel, of Co. B, Eleventh Penna. Cavalry, was killed, a short distance from Middletown, yesterday. We learn that he left this city, on a freight train, and when at the above place fell between the cars, and was run over. He was cut off, an arm broken, and his head considerably bruised. He lived but an hour after the accident. Hummel was a resident of Chambersburg, at which place he entered the service of his country. He had remained in and when killed had a fortnight for thirty days. He had on his person a gold watch and about \$40 in money. We learn that the citizens of Middletown intended to have his remains properly interred there.

ROBBERS IN OUR MIDST.—Safe Blown Up.—Two daring attempts at robbery (one of which was successful) were made in our city, on Saturday night. There are professional robbers in our midst, cannot be denied.

The liquor establishment of Mr. George G. Kunkel, near the foot of Walnut street, was entered before eleven o'clock, on Saturday night, by a party who succeeded in obtaining a handsome reward for their trouble, in the shape of money, checks, and other valuable papers. They attacked the safe with an iron bar, and a hole was made in the outside door, into which powder was inserted, the match applied, and the door broken—the cement and other material which rendered it fire proof being scattered throughout the building. The inside door was broken in a similar manner, and the thieves were enabled to lay hold of the money and valuable papers in the safe. The report caused by the explosion was heard by the neighbors, but none of them knew where or what it was, until the proprietor, Mr. Kunkel, happened to arrive, and discovered what had occurred. The exact amount of Mr. K's loss is not known by him. He offers a reward of three hundred dollars for the detection and conviction of the thieves. The public are cautioned against purchasing any of the checks or papers stolen.

During the same night the warehouse of Mr. David McCormick, near the foot of Third street, was also entered, probably by the same party. Here the operations were about the same as in the above case. A hole was drilled in the door of the warehouse, and inserted, and ignited, and the fire-proof filling scattered. There being but one door, the burglars were at once enabled to reach the contents, which consisted of a few postage stamps—all the money and other valuables having been removed. The stamps were not taken. It seems strange that the thieves were not seen, as (we are informed) a man was employed to watch the building as well as some Government property near by. The only reason doubtless is that they were expert professional burglars, and sharp enough to defy detection.

Our citizens should be on the alert, as other attempts to rob will doubtless be made by the same parties. No club has yet been had as to who were the individuals concerned in the above high handed attacks on private property. It is hoped that they may be brought to justice.

SERIOUS RAILROAD ACCIDENT.—Twenty-six Persons Injured.—The Philadelphia Express train, west, on the Pennsylvania railroad, on Sunday morning, was thrown from the track by the breaking of an axle under the tender of the engine, just as the train was going on bridge No. 8, two and a half miles east of Tyrone. The express, baggage and four passenger cars ran off the side of the bridge and fell into the Little Juniata river. Before relief could be obtained, the cars took fire from the coals of the upset stoves, and, with one span of the bridge, were consumed. None of the passengers were killed. Twenty-six were injured, one seriously. The injured passengers were all conveyed to the Tyrone House, Altoona, where everything is being done to make them comfortable. The conductor of the train, Mr. Leisingring, Mr. W. H. Wise, express messenger, and Baggage Master McGregor, were seriously, but not dangerously injured.

All the axles and part of the passengers' baggage and express goods were saved before the flames reached them.

Levi F. Bowers, Blair county, cut in head and shoulder bruised.

John Mott, Allegheny City, 1st Penna. Artillery, leg injured.

A. D. Harrison, 1st Penna. Artillery, of Butler county, Pa., arm broken and leg bruised.

Benjamin Crosby, of Westmoreland county, Pa., arm and leg bruised.

John Spowley, Westmoreland county, Pa., bruised in head.

Michael Bonham, 48th Pennsylvania volunteers, leg broken.

Philip Matthew, 1011 North Third street, Philadelphia, right leg broken.

Andrew Pratt, soldier, bruised in back.

A soldier named Helmer, belonging to the 45th Pennsylvania volunteers, was bruised in back.

Thomas Light, soldier, leg injured.

T. J. Howard, of Lawrenceville, was slightly wounded in back, but was able to take the train home.

All of the above persons are now at the Logan House, Altoona, where they are receiving the proper medical attention. Mr. Steinhilber is the only person that is considered dangerously injured, and it is feared that he will not live.

The bridge over the Little Juniata has already been repaired, so that there will be no detention to the trains.

P. S.—Since the above has been written, we have learned that Mr. Steinhilber died last night.

THE INAUGURATION OF GOVERNOR CURTIN.—Civil and Military Arrangements.—The committee in charge of the ceremonies for the second inauguration of Andrew G. Curtin, report that the arrangements are all complete, and that the responses to invitations sent to various military and civil organizations throughout the Commonwealth indicate the presence of a large crowd on the occasion. Already the presence of the military begins to indicate the strength of this portion of the display, while the accommodations secured at our hotels, show that the presence of the people will be unusually large.

We print below the programme of the procession as decided upon by the Committee of Arrangements:

Programme for the Inauguration of Gov. A. G. Curtin on Tuesday, Jan. 19, 1864.

M., where carriages will be in waiting for them.

The civil organizations and specially invited guests in carriages will form on Fourth street, right resting on Market.
