SERIOUS RAILHOAD ACCIDENT-Twenty-six Persons Injured.—The Philadelphia Express train, west, on the Pennsylvania railroad, on Sunday morning, was thrown from the track by the breaking of an axle under the tender of the engine, just as the train was going on bridge No. 8, two and a half miles east of Tyrone. The express, baggage and four passenger cars eight o'clock, on Tuesday morning, 19th ran off the side of the bridge and fell into the Little Juniata river.
