He had previously deserted from a New York regiment, and went to the Fifty-fifth as a substitute. He was a German, and came to this country about eight years ago.

PEACHES TILLED. -It is stated that the peach crop next season in the West and Southwest will probably be slim, if not altogether a failure. In many sections it is thought the hard freeze about the first of January has killed not only the fruit, but the trees. Early chermics as well as peaclies were killed in the vicinity of Cincinnati.

But one meal a day with a rollation is allowed, except on Sundays, and the use of mean is restricted to five days of the week, on four of which it can be used but once each day.— Those under twenty-one, or who laborhard, or who from weakness cannot fast without great prejudice to their health, are not required to adhere to the rules; but allothers not specially exempted must fast as directed.


