AN EXCELLENT APPOINTMENT.-Col. John R. Brooke, of the Fifty-third regiment Pennsylvania Veteran Volunteers, has been placed in command of Camp Curtin, by order of the War Department, vice Capt. Wm. A. Sands, relieved. We consider this a most excellent and judicious selection. Col Brooke, although the youngest Colonel in the service, is acknowledged to be one of the very best volunteer officers which Pennsylvania has contributed to the war. Immediately after the breaking out of the rebellion, he raised a company of volunteers for the three months service, and upon the return of his regiment he received authority from Governor Curtin to raise a regiment for "three years or during the war." The Fifty-third regiment was speedily raised, and at once assigned to the Army of the Potomec, where it gallantly participated in every skirmish and battle fought by that noble army. They, originally numbered one thousand men, but the sad havoc of war has reduced their number to two hundred, who have to a man re-enlisted for the war. The veteran Fifty-third regiment has crowned itself with immortal glory, and its gallant leader will live in the brightest range of the history of this rebellion [Gol.
