In Steubenville, on Friday last, a man named George White was arrested and committed to jail by the Mayor, to await a requisition from Governor Curtin, on a charge of maylem, in putting out the right eye of one Cyrus H. Gordon, a resident of Chambersburg, in this State. A writ of habeas corpus was sued out in his case, and the prisoner was discharged on the ground that the Mayor had not the authority to arrest him. The prisoner was immediately arrested by Provost Marshal Campbell, "for aiding and abetting the enemy," during the rebel raid at Chambersburg, Pa; last summer, and at last accounts was still in custody.

FIRE IN LEWISTOWN. On Saturday evening fire broke out in a stable occupied by Mr. Abner Thompson, in Lewistown, and before the flames could be extinguished five stables were destroyed.
