SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and Section 1. Be it enacted by the Sendic and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the loan authorized by an ordinance of the common council of the city of Harrisburg, approved January 27, 1864, for the payment of a bounty to volunteers, be and the same in or a pounty to volunteers, be and the same is hereby legalized and made valid and binding; and authority is hereby granted to said council to lewy and collect a special tax; not exceeding eight mills on the dollar, on all property in said city taxable by the laws of this Commonwealth for State and county purposes, for the re-payment of said loan with interest—said tax to be collected as other taxes are now by law collected in said city. This act to continue in force until said debt is paid: Provided That each individual shall pay a tax of not less than one dollar.


