His indiscretion in this instance, by entering a crowd of drunken soldiers alone, is hardly excusable, and yet it is not our desire to censure even an over-zealous officer in the discharge of his duty. If any censure is due in these cases of ruffianism and drunkenness it belongs to the Mayor, whose duty it is to close up these rum holes, where soldiers are maddened and infuriated with diquor, until they become fit for any work of violence. It is not possible that the Mayor can be blind to the fact, that all the disturbances created among the returning volunteers is directly due to the rum holes with which Harrisburg is cursed. Let him close these dens, and his officers will not be assailed while in the dis-
