In your issue of last evening, I find an article under the caption of "Whisky among the soldiers," stating that "whilst a party of returned cavalrymen were carousing in the neighborhood of Fourth and Walnut streets this morning" I "made my appearance and this morning," I "made my appearance and vigorously attempted to quell the disturbance." The information upon which that article was based must have been quite limited, and as injustice has been done, (unintentionally no doubt,) I desire to make a full statement, in order that the citizens of this place and the public generally may know the facts in the


