FATAL RAILBOAD ACCIDENT .--- On Friday. hight the engineer of the fast line west, on the Pennsylvania Railroad, due here at half-past one o'clock Saturday morning, discovered a lamp on the track, between Bolivar and Blairsville. The lamp appeared to be stationary, but he whistled "down brakes," and checked up the train. The cow-catcher struck the lamp and knocked it off the track. On making an examination of the ground, a body of a woman was found lying some distance from the track. She had evidently been struck by a train, but as her limbs were cold it was inferred that perhaps she had been struck by the fast-line east, which had passed that point a short time previously. It was contended, however, that if struck by the eastern bound train, the lamp would have been extinguished.
