THE DRAFT IN THE CITY.—We understand that Captain J. K. Clement, Provost Marshal of the Fourteenth district, has transmitted through Col. Bumford, Superintendent of the Recruiting Service, to the War Department. the papers and statement laid before the Board of Enrollment by the City Council of Harrisburg. These papers and statement contain the conclusive evidence that the different wards in the city of Harrisburg have filled their quota of the present draft, and that they are justly entitled to exemption from conscription. In this correspondence Col. Clement earnestly and respectfully urges on Provost Marshal General Fry the necessity of promptness in recognizing the facts set forth by the City Council, so that we may safely look for the order exempting Harrisburg from the draft, in a very few days.

ARRIVAL OF VETERANS.—The remnant of the Seventy-seventh Regiment Pennsylvania Volunteers arrived here yesterday morning, under command of Captain Lawson. The Seventy-seventh was originally commanded by Colonel F. S. Stumbaugh, (who was subsequently promoted to Brigadier General,) who was succeeded by Colonel Rose. Of over one thousand men who originally composed the regiment, one hundred and ninety-five remain. These noble men participated in every engagement from the battle of Shiloh to that of Chickamauga, and lost heavily on every occasion. They always stood up nobly, and fought valiantly for the Stars and Stripes. No regiment has won greater honors than the Seventy-seventh. These noble heroes of many battles have re-enlisted, and have reing, and visiting their homes. In a month they will return to the field-it is hoped with full ranks. A number of their officers are already engaged in recruiting. Persons who desire to enter the service cannot find a more honored organization with which to connect themselves.

A MAGNIFICENT DISPLAY OF SRILL IN THE Manufacture of Confections.—Harrisburg Sends Greeting to Lancaster and York .- We had the pleasure this morning of examining two magnificent specimens of the skill, liberality and patriotism of one of our most successful confectioners. The articles consisted of two pyramids formed of the most splendid cake and confectionery, which we can only briefly describe as follows:

The base of the pyramid is formed of a purely iced cake, eighteen inches in circumference, around which is gathered a wreath of full blown white roses; in open spaces between the roses, are representations, in basrelief, of an Amazon, mounted on horseback, engaged in a fierce struggle with a tiger; and of a farewell between a volunteer and his family. Upon this rests another cake, fourteen inches in circumference, iced and surrounded also by a wreath of roses: while the top of the base forms still another cake, also iced, and surrounded with scrolls and festoons, displaying in bas-relief, portraits of the immortal Washington. Bising above the apex is the representation of a fort, complete in all its armament and appointmentswhile above the fort, and from its centre, float a stand of American colors, and high above all, is the American Eagle holding in its beak the crown of immortal fame. The coloring of each article is true to the real object sought to be imitated, while the construction and arrangement of the fort is faithful to the most minute detail of such a work. Mounted guns, magazine, pyramids of ball and shot—in fact, all the implements of well ordered and modernly constructed fort are here most accurately reproduced in confectionery; rendering it decidedly the most successful piece of work of the kind we ever examined.

-These splendid specimens of confectionery were manufactured by Mr. Felix, for presentation to the managers of the Sanitary Fairs respectively of York and Lancaster, as a testimony as well for the valor of the soldier as for the efforts of those who are nobly laboring for his relief and comfort. Strangers who come here, leave with the mpression, that the crime which they behold is the result of the social organizations of the people, the citizens, the residenters of Harrisburg. But this is a mistake. The disgrace from which the city suffers, is more the result of the condition produced by the war, than of any defect in our social organization. Hundreds and thousands of men have been cast upon the town, attracted hither either by the necessities of the duty imposed by the military service, or tempted to linger in our midst by the hope of gain which their cupidity teaches them to believe attends speculation. In this manner and by these influences, a semi-social organization has been effected in this city, for which our own citizens are not responsible, and of which the greater portion are totally ignorant. This social organization breeds innumerable vices, and has its wants, from which Harrisburg suffers in her most vital parts. We suffer because the influence leaves its wrecks behind. We suffer, because the vice, with insidious grasp, is seizing upon our fairest youth, and as it makes wrecks of these, scatters them on the shore of to hearken to her kind entreaty and try for that domestic retreat which is far away from myself.
