SUICIDE.—Mrs. Amy McGuire, of Lancaster, committed suicide on Wednesday afternoon, by drowning herself in Conestoga Creek.

THE GAME LAW.—The game law fixes a penalty of \$5 upon any person who kills or destroys certain birds out of season; as follows: Partridges from the first of February to the first of September; quails and rabbits from the first of February to the first of October; woodcocks from the first of February to the fourth of July.
