The working expenses of the road hifve been 73 1-10 per cent of the receipts... This however, includes the purchase of four new locomotives; at a cost of \$66,865; which does not properly belong to working expenses be-

not properly belong to working expenses, be-sides new passenger, baggage, express and freight cars, costing \$158,690,69, and the par-tial renewal of bridges destroyed, \$55,000; which would reduce the working expenses to 61 81-100 per cent. of the earnings, showing any increase over the expenses of the pre-vious year of 10 1-10 per cent. This increase vious year of 10 1-10 per cent. between Buffalo and Baltimore. The revenue from the local passenger business in December last showed an increase of 20 per cent. over the revenue of the corresponding month of the previous year. It is intended to afford every possible facility for the local travel. The Board regret that they are unable to report any progress in the important work of

the Canton extension, owing to the opposition of the Mayor of Baltimore. In purguance of a resolution unanimously adopted at the last meeting of the stockholders, the Board have leased for 999 years the Shamokin Valley and Pottsville Railroad, and the Elmira and Williamsport Railroad, upon terms which at the time were, considered favorable, with a view of securing a perfect line with a policy in harmony with the interests of the company, between Baltimore and lakes Brie and Ontario.

The net revenue of the Samokin Valley and Pottsville Railroad from Feb. 183, 1863, (the date at which the Board took possession,) to December 31st, 1863, sums up \$26,256 03, being over 3 per cent. on the entire amount of the capital stock of the road. The operation of the Elmira and Williamsbort road, since the lease of it by the Board, May 1st, 1863, up to December 31st, 1863, shows a net revenue of \$2,368 63. These results are re-

garded as very satisfactory.

In order to fully carry out the wishes of the stockholders as expressed in the resolution referred to the Board effected an arrange-ment with the Brie Railway Company of the State of New York for the operation of the Baltimore and Philadelphia trade over the Buffalo, New York and Eric Railroad (which has been leased by the Eric Railroad Company) from Buffalo and Rochester.

The Board, however, are unable to give any accurate statement as to the loss organi growing out of this contract, owing to the non-receipt of full reports from the Erie Railway Company, who have control of the accounts. The operation of the road, under the control of the Board, or in which they have an interest by contract, has been limited by the absence of the much needed double track.

In relation to the numerous delays which have occurred during the past year, the Board say the affairs of all departments, upon full investigation, appear to have performed their duties in a creditable manner, and the delays have been occasioned by endeavors to accommodate the very heavy business and the public too, and thus the road has been taxed be-

yond its capacity.

This state of affairs, it is thought, must continue to some extent until the close of the war. The resolution passed at the last meeting of the stockholders, recommending the Board to declare a dividend out of the profits of the last year of six per cent: on the capital has not been complied with, because upon entering upon the present year to fully carry out the wishes of the stockholders with regard to the improvement of the company d have a large amount of work done upon the road, including new bridges and extension of double track and sidlings, made contracts for large supplies of materials of all descriptions, in view of an anticipated advance in the price of them, expecting, after making these heavy property, the Board made arrangements to have a large amount of work done upon the road including new bridges and extension of

They would not have declared a dividend after having arranged for the heavy expenditure just referred to without creating a floating debt. It is also mentioned in this connection that the cost of building the road has been materially increased by a part of the payment therefor being made in bonds at par, irrespective of their depreciated market value at the time of pay-

ment.

It is proper that this extra cost should be liquidated by applying a corresponding amount of the sum now appearing to credit of profit and loss before any steek dividend can be made. The General Superintendent in his report recommends the expenditure of \$1,500. 000 as requisite to place this road and its equipments in the condition necessary to do The meeting proceeded to the selection of the business now offering, and for the trade directions, when 36,865 shares were voted out of uncompleted connected roads. His suggestions are recommended by the Board for adoption.
