NATIONAL CURRENCY ACT.—The principal amendments proposed to the national currency act by the comptroller of the currency

THE BEST are as follows: National Banks are to be required to redeem their circulating notes in the city of New York at a small discount. A uniform rate of interest (seven per cent.) is to be es-tablished throughout the United States for rational banks

The lawful money reserve that is to be kept on hand is to be reduced from 25 to 15 per cent. for country banks, and from 25 to 20 per cent. for city banks. Provision is also made for the closing of banks whenever the owners of two-thirds of the capital stock shall deem it expedient Banks cannot be organiz-
