HAMILTON, Esq., President of Dauphin County Agricultural Society: The committee, appointed to examine and award premiums for thorough bred horses and trotters, respectfully report, that Dr. Boteler, exhibited a Gelding claimed to be thorough bred, but your committee was not furnished with satisfactory testimony of pedigree or certificate of importation.

This was the only animal on exhibition in this class, and your committee recommend a diploma for the owner of the horse. He was symmetrical in figure, and had many indications of purity of blood.

The committee award the first premium of ten dollars for best Trotting Horse to Eby Byers, and the second of five dollars to C. J. Roleman, for his trotting horse "Tom Florence." The speed of these animals was tested in a very beautiful and exciting trot—the best two out of three one mile heats round the track.

The former horse won two straight heats, making them respectively in 2:52 and 2:54. Mr. Byer's horse is a light bay, about sixteen hands high, young of elegant form, and gentle in disposition. His trotting is clean and spirited, and gives promise, with proper training, of much greater speed than was displayed in the match.

The horse "Tom Florence" has speed and endurance, going steadily and manifesting experienced handling. With the two above mentioned horses, another was exhibited by Wm. Metzger, evincing speed and action.
