



grossness that may surround them. The age of machinery was inaugurated nearly a century ago by the inventions of James Watt, who found the steam engine a rude, imperfect, and impracticable machine. After years of ex-periment and research, he bequeathed to the world the engine in all the perfections of prin ciple that we behold it now; and though it has since his day, been produced in much more ex-tended forms, and adorned with rich trappings, it has not undergone and it of change in rich. it has not undergone an lots of change in prin-ciples since it passed the ordeal of his fruitful ciples since it passed the ordeal of his fruitful ginus. Contrasting the engine as it came from the hands of Waty with the unwieldly and de-structive machine it was before he touched it with the wand of his new mind, we are enabled to appreciate the value of his labors, which, if not embalmed in lofty poetry and prose as is the heroism that overset the form the townee the form the townee we as shawl for the Emperess Jose-bene; and the machine so altered and con-bructed, under the very shadow of a throne, is conferred more benefits on France than all the walke exploits of her renowned Emperor.— Other inventions, such as the hydrostatic press. prose, as is the heroism that overcast the face of humanity with gloom, and is nourished by the Blanchard lathe for turning shoe lasts and the tears of the widow and orphan, are never-theless destined to an immortality as enduring as civilization itself. He demonstrated the forsibility of water steam of years bith means the led the way in the application-adapted the engine to rotary motion, and crowned it with the elegant automaton device; styled the governor; by which the throttle valve that admits the steam to the cylinder is worked; and the speed of the engine regulated. But as a complete anatomy of the engine would occupy too much space here, we commend it to the study of all who have any pretensions to intelligence, and take an interest in an agency that is doing more to equalize the condition of men, and to promote civilization, than all the fine spun po-

possesses more interest than the invention of the loom, by M. Jacquard, for weaving shawis of variegated colors, silks of the ricnest pat-terns, and other styles of goods, which, before the advention the Jacquard machine, were con-fined to the wear of the affluent alone, but the different manufacture in the affluent alone, but the almost miruculous inventive powers of a French-man, have placed them within the reach of nearly all classes. This loom was originally intended to weave nets; and the Emperor hearing of its magical structure and capabilities, summoned Jacquard, through the Perfect of Lyons, to appear before him. The mechanist was hurried off to Paris without an explanation, and when in the preseuce of Napoleon, he was confounded and shocked by the impious questions of the notorious Carnot, who asked him, whether he was the man who could do what whether he was the man who could do what the Aimighty could not, "the a knot in a stretch-id string."
