Henry Ward Beecher on the Present

State of Affairs.

On the Sunday after the Presidential election, Henry Ward Beecher preached morning and evening, at his church in Brooklyn, upon the present aspect of affairs in this country. The sermons were listened to by immense audiences. The morning discourse related mere particularly to 'God's Overruling Providence." After an exposition of the ways in which God overrules the actions of men, he counseled his

hearers to trust in God, and said: "This is the course prescribed for us, if we desire rest and peace in God. A man who looks at God, seeking first the Kingdom of God, and his righteousness, cannot be disturbed. On the tops of our steepled churches we frequently notice, weathercocks, which turn this, that, or the other way, according as the wind may chance to blow—(and thus we can generally tell which way the wind blows by looking at the church)—and men look at the cock and see it go round, never once thinking of the straight, stiff rod of iron which points directly up into Heaven, never varying, though the cock goes at every breeze, but always silently pointing upward. So should we'be-not turning, the subjects of every fear and commotion, but looking with un-swerving confidence and faith towards God the Ruler and Director of all. If we did not know these facts, if we had not all our tife long been educated to believe this, we might be pitied for our vacillation, but not blamed; but as it is, it is shameful. I am ashamed when I hear a Christian man (a worldly man has no God) who is loved by the Jehovah Christ, who might enter into the very secret chamber of God, and touch his heart and be sustained by him, complain and murmur, and run to the stern of the ship to wake up Christ, lest all on board should be engulfed by the waves around. Let the overladen Christ sleep! He is in the ship: he sleeps but for a moment then

there will be a calm." He gave illustrations of the manner in which men conduct themselves when they are swayed solely by the tide of human af-

fairs: "I have seen, said he, a populous cheese and its occupants. How greedy they are how mimble—how agile—how they fight for this and that. Ah! I say to myself, men are not the only politicians. They are punished enough—and we wouldn't but they attempt to teach and corrupt the young. They are ravens, blinded by intense selfishness, filling the air with words of

warning and fear. On the hill side, where I spend my summers, I have often sat while reading till a dark shadow would cross my book, and my ear would catch the odious "Caw, caw, caw," of the crow. They might distract iny attention for a moment—they might fill my eyes for a second, as lazily they swept in circle after circle, till too far off for view, but I never thought of asking their opinion ofhealthy flesh-or about anything connect ted with the sanitary condition of the counry's cattle-neither shall I do it in politics any more than in nature Let these people crow till they are hoarse-they are not

our teachers-God is. Go to him. Other men take counsel from commercial causes. Business is the place for fluctuapart of human nature bnrn the flercest; and although it or those who attended to it are not to be despised, you should not go there for teachings in troublous times. Have rest with God. Aye, though the ocean roar with the storm, He sits in everlasting peace. Neither should you go to the moods of worldly men for advice in uneasy times. The world is but a poor thing after all. In ordinary affairs it is wise enough, but beyond that most of men are very foolish. Take the world as a whole men do not average much. One day all is quiet and serene with them and the next all is panic, trouble and uproar. They are all nucertain, like a distracted and disordered compass, which points one way as well as another. Some men who are the very strongest in calm and quiet times; but who have no abiding and settled moral p inciple, are the weakest, and silliest, and most perfect fools in times of public disturbance. In olden times sailors were brave and chippy, while the headlands were in sight, but the moment they got out to sea, IS THE CHEAPEST PLACE IN THE CITY and the waves began to roll in heavily, or the winds to blow stiffly, they would ory out aloud for fear, give up control, and let her drift whithersoever the ship might

choose. (See Acts)
Possibly it may occur to you that I am preaching about affairs to day in New York -perhaps drifting towards politios. Well, perhaps I am; and if it will do you any good. I have no objection to your thinking good. I have no objection to your tunking so. It does me good—heart good—to see all things going just right, and all menerying and boohooing about it. When everything is straight, people fearing to be eaten by dragons, good Christian men praying and singing all day Sunday, getting on as far as Tuesday, when a little trouble comes, and forgetting their prayers and their songs they ory out—and rush to their chests—their money—their stocks and chests—their money—their stocks and bonds—and look to each other and to great men for comfort. Oh! ye fools! oh! ye roots! Does not the God of Omnipitence reign? and does he sleep forgetful of those matters precious to him as the apple of his eye? Don't let us be tem-per tossed; but ask which way points righteon ness, justice, humanity, thuth, ORANGES AND LEMONS social purity, public faith.
