Scholars and Gentlemen.

To say truly of a man that he is a scholar and a gent'eman, is to pay him one of the high-est personal compliments. Echolarship alone, of any noteworthy grade, is the truit of such a devoted pursuit of knowledge for knowledge sake, of so much seif-d-ni-l, of such natural ca-pacity, that the distinction which it wins is most richly earned. And whether, in the completest sense of the word, there are more gendemen than scholars, may, rechaps, at least admit of purstion. To merit both distinctions may, therefore, well be coveted by those who strive to win real honor.

If there be a locality where scholars and gentlemen might be looked for, at least in an embry onic form, needing only development and fected growth, it is a college—a place where, it would seem, all the influences are such as tend to the suppression of the coar er prepensities of man's nature, and the nurrure of all the iner. And yet among college students there are such manifestations of brutality that they constitute a remarkable phenomenon at college life. do not refer to the occasional exhibition by in-dividual of a gross and selfish indifference to the comfort and the feelings of others, but to organized and per cruated systems of terment, which a conflicted and expected to be borne as matters almost as indecent to a college course as a passage through the academic corriculum. The recent proceedings at Harvard college are striking examples of this sort of prescriptive brutality, which, by the way, is, in most name, because it is practiced especially upon the young, the timid, and the inexperienced, by those who have the advantage of at least one year's trial and induration; and how much that does for a lad at college, only those who have gone through it can well know. In this case it was, as usual, the fr shmen who suffered at the hands of those self-taught Nestors of college life—Nestors who (in their own opinion) add to their own venerability the wisdom of Ulysses and the dignity of Agamennon—the sophomores. These advanced gentlemen have been in the habit of "hazing" the freshmen— 'hazing' being a collegiate cuphonism for "hazing" being a collegiate cuphonism for worrying, abusing, territying, maltreating — Lads fresh from quiet homes, untaught in the mysterious ways of college life, yet friencless because so recently placed in their n-w positions that they have had no time to make friends, with, most likely, their first heart-sinking fit of home sickness full upon them, are seiz d by those who have gone through the same sad experience, and made the butt of brutality, which stops just short of serious personal violence, and sometimes passes that boundary. There is no possible defence of these proceedings, and no palliation except their traproceedings, and no pallation except their tra-ditionary character. Long usage i held to jus-tify them; and the lad who resists in earnest, and on the ground of right, unless he can en-

dure much, and carry matters with a very high hand, is broken in by the force of numbers, and the public opinion of the strange place in which he encounters this trying experience. The faculty of Harvard has done well in deciding to put an end to these coarse cu-toms by the strong arm of authority. Their effect is brotalizing upon both parties; and it is high time that they ceased, along with many other time-than nored abuses. President Felton rightly pronounced them to be much unworthy of those who aimed to be scholars and gentlemen.

SPIRITUALISM IN ENGLAND. - Quite a controversy is regeng in some of the London papers with regard to the merits of Hume and Spiritualism. A gentleman, who appends his name to the communication as a piedge of the truth of his statement, sends to the London Star an extraordinary account of the performances of Hume. He says:

I distinctly saw the accordeon moving, and heard it playing, when held only at one end, ag in and ag du. I held it myself for a short time, and had good reason to know that it was vehemently pulled at the other end, and not by Mr. Hume's trace as her bear wind. Mr. Hume's toes, as has been wirely surmired, unless that gentleman has legs three yards log, with toes at the end of them quite as marvelous as any legion of spirits. For, be it stated, that such music as we heard was no or-dinary strain; it was grand at times, at others pathetic, at others distant and long drawn, to a legree which no one can imagine who has not heard it. I have heard Blagrove repeated y, but it is no libel on that master of the instru-ment to say that he never produced such exquisite distant and echo notes as those which de-lighted our ears. The instrument played, too, at distant parts of the room, many yards away from all of us. I believe I am stating a fact when I say that not one person in that room could play the accorden at all. Mr. Hume cannot play a note upon it.
