DIRECTIONS

BREAKPAST AND TEA ROLLE.—Two or three teaspoons of the control of Leaven. (according to the quality of the four,) to one quart of flour; mix thoroughly by passing two or three tenses through a sieve; rub in a piece of butter half the size of an egg, and make the paste with cold milk or water, (milk is preferable) bereity stiff enough to permit rolling out. Much kneading should be avoided. Cut into desired form, and place immediately in a hot oven and bake quickly.

Loav Bread.—The same proportions of Leaven and flour sifted together as above; omit the butter, and make the paste stiff enough to knead into a loaf, and bake immediately in a slow oven.

CUP CAKE.—Three cups of flour and three teaspoonsful of Leaven, sifted together; then add a cup of currants, and spice to suit the taste. Bake about half an hour.

LADIES CAKE.—Three quarters of a pound of flour and four teaspoonsful of Leaven sifted together; one pound of sugar, and six ounces of butter beaten to a cream; the whites of eight eggs well beaten, and the juice of one lemon; mix with milk.

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Official Organ Grinding.

We observe that certain gentlemen are contemplating the establishment, at Washington City, of a newspaper "organ" for Mr. Lincoln's Administration. Such institutions are not necessarily public nuisances; but they have been conducted in such a manner that the objections to them are innumerable. It seems but fair that a President should have a newspaper channel through which he could communicate with the public, and in whose columns he could be delended against the unjust charges of his enemies. But "organ-grinding," at the Federal Capital, is a modern invention of corrupt politicians. The man who turns the crank is obliged to furnish just such music as will suit his employers; lying ought to be one of his natural faculties, for a man to acquire, even by long practice, the ability to multiply falsehoods with a rapidity corresponding with the demand in an Administration organ. When the ma-chine gets out of order, he has only to oil the wheels with a Post-office advertisement, open the throttle valve, and stand clear of the cogs—all will be bright and beautiful as a summer's morning. The Or-gan serves a variety of noble and beneficent purposes, not understood by all the people

of the land. It has a corps of Jenkinses, who, by vir-It has a corps of Jenkinses, who, by virtue of their profession, secure admission to the "hops" at the hotels, the levees of the foreign Ministers, &c., and describe the species of gloves, vests, pants, boots, dresses, shawls and jewlery worn by the elite. The Jenkinses have wide noses, and are so accustomed to musk, bear's oil, and various horrible ointments required by fashingly accident that they are tell by the ionable society, that they can tell by the very odor of an audience whether it is genteel or vulgar. These enterprising young men are not only endowed with amazing nasal power; they pounce on all the peccad-illoes with which high life is necessarily adorned, and many a scandal like the Sickles affair would sleep in oblivion but for these modest youngsters. They know just who accompanies everybody's wife from parties, and whether everything is just as it ought to be, and can relate with Parisian scrupulousness the att tudes of a Minister's attache and a New York belie through all the fearful mazes and affectionate embraces of Les Lanciers. The private journals of these sub-editors are printed in the "Organ," and become part of the public records of the country. They are of immense value, as they will serve to show to future ages the high state of morals characterizing

Washington City in the middle of the nineteenth century. But the great object of the projectors of a newspaper organ is to secure the control of the public plunder. The ostensible editor is generally a mere sand-bag bag, so situated as to protect from the public eye the real sappers and miners of the national treasury. He is expected to bear all the odium, and meet all the danger, while others do the work. When he finds the fat growing thin on his ribs, and the butcher-bills accumulating, he has only to walk to the "Lobby," and threaten to turn State's evidence, and his hungry pockets

at once protruded with richness. The Organ is simply an entering wedge to the public money; its circulation is always limited, its editorials are always partisan, and it is nothing more nor less than an imposition upon the public. If Mr. LINCOLN desires to keep his soul unspotted, he will do well to use a pair of heavy boots on the first jobbers that shall attempt to constitute themselves his body-guard and organ. - CINCINNATI TIMES.

Our National Quickstep.

We remember once to have been scoffed

at by a musical friend for asserting that of

all national airs, Yankee Doodle was the most inspiring, and that as a composition it deserved to take rank among the highest of such melodies, having nothing ridiculous about it except its unfortunate name. It is some satisfaction to see how enthusiastically this opinion is endorsed in a volume of travels, entitled "A Run through Eu-rope," by Mr. Benedict, a popular lawyer of New York—and, by the way, the author of one of the most agreeable and instructive books of the kind that has been issued this season. Mr. Benedict says:
"I remember when it was fashionable to laugh at Yankee Doodle as a vulgar air, written to make fun of our extempore soldiers of the olden time—how it was written by Dr. Shackburg, and given to our soldiers as a celebrated European air, to ridicule their foundess for European fashions. Notwithstanding its simplicity, our troops have kept time to its measures on all their fields of glory-and it is quite impossible to imagine an air more perfectly fitted to the national tone of such a people as ours. As we have grown stronger and greater-as the stars and stripes have floated higher and higher over more and more fields of triumph—so Yankee Doodle has risen in the scale of merit, and I believe it is at last discovered to be not a new, nor an American air, nor a burlesque, nor a musical drollery, but it is founded among the most precious musical archieves of—I do not know how many musical na-tions—preserved and separated, and selected for immortality by the shifting ages of traditional popular harmony. It is indeed among the music of the nations. Its chords have vibrated with the heart strings of the people in all ages. The Alpine echoes have repeated its strains. It has more than once broken out among the ariozo of emasculated Italy. The Suliote has rallied to it in the forest glades of Greece. France has been made insane by it. Cromwell has led his troops to its restless quickstep.— Blind Ziska's invincible brother strode to miraculous triumphs in the spirit of its rebellious measures - [Contral Presbyterian.
