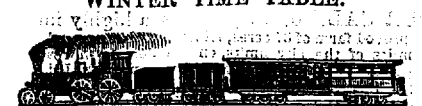

FIVE TRAINS DAILY TO AND FROM PHILADELPHIA.

ON AND AFTER MONDAY, NOVEMBER 26th, 1860.

The passenger trains of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company will depart from and arrive at Harrisburg and Philadelphia as follows:—

EASTWARD.

THROUGH EXPRESS TRAIN leaves Harrisburg at 2.40 a. m., and arrives at West Philadelphia at 6.50 a. m.
FAST LINE leaves Harrisburg at 2.58 p. m., and arrives at West Philadelphia at 5.00 p. m.
MAIL TRAIN leaves Harrisburg at 6.21 p. m., and arrives at West Philadelphia at 10.20 p. m.

These trains make close connection at Philadelphia with the New York Lines.

WESTWARD.

THROUGH EXPRESS TRAIN leaves Philadelphia at 10.00 p. m., arrives at Harrisburg at 8.10 a. m.

MAIL TRAIN leaves Philadelphia at 8.00 a. m., arrives at Harrisburg at 1.30 p. m.

LOCAL MAIL TRAIN leaves Harrisburg for Philadelphia at 7.00 a. m.

FAST LINE leaves Philadelphia at 12.00 noon, arrives at Harrisburg at 4.15 p. m.

HARRISBURG ACCOMMODATION TRAIN leaves Philadelphia at 2.00 p. m., and arrives at Harrisburg at 7.35 p. m.

ACCOMMODATION TRAIN, leaves Philadelphia at 4.00 p. m., and arrives at Harrisburg at 9.45 p. m.

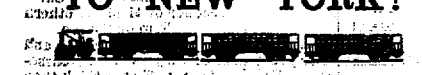
