We therefore, claim the right of being heard, with out regard to any opposition from those who are the recipients of our hard earnings under the law; and it is of no avail to conceal from

you the fact that the great mast of your con-stituents are opposed to this new office, with its salary imposed on them. We, therefore, ask for its immediate repeal, and as in duty bound,
