COPPER FIRE BOXES FOR LOCOMOTIVES .- The Pennsylvania Railroad Company have, for several years past, been using copper fire boxes on coal burning engines, twenty two of which were put in during last year. It is stated that the average duration of a copper fire box, using Pittsburgh coal for fuel, has been five years, while the average of iron fire boxes is from eighteen to twenty-two months. The cost of putting in a copper fire box, labor and material, is \$910; deduct the value of old material when renewed, \$280; making the net cost per engine \$680. The net cost for an iron fire box is \$479. As two iron fire boxes will not last as long as one of copper, there is a difference of nearly \$300 in favor of the copper.
