CAMP CURTIN .- The exceeding fine weather of to-day served to draw a large portion of our Counsylvania mustered into the United States population to Camp Curtin, and our livery staservice at this point, since the formation of ble men and omnibus proprietors, in conse-Quence, reaped an abundant harvest of dimes.

The camp, throughout the day, presented its usual scene of bustle and activity. Everybody, except civic visitors, seemed to be full of business, and, under these circumstances, to gain any information was almost impossible. The visitors, therefore, had to be content with looking, and rely upon the fertility of their imagination to satisfy their curiosity.

The troops, as fast as they arrive on the ground, are furnished with quarters, after which they report to Captain Simmons, U. S. A., who swears and musters them into the service. After this duty has been performed, they report to the Adjutant General, who furnishes them with arms, and they then form a part and parcel of the camp.

The raw recruits are portioned off into squads, and first instructed in the marching evolutions, after which they drill by companies, and then with muskets. These manoeuvreings form the most interesting feature of the camp, and always attract crowds of spectators.

About two thousand men left the Camp last night for active duty, and more are to leave to-night, but as fresh troops are constantly arriving, one perceives little or no diminution of the number.
