MORE FLAG RAISING.—A large and handsome American flag has been raised to the steeple of the new Court House.

A FINE COMPANY of "Continental" arrived at Camp Curtin last night from Tamaqua. They are a fine looking body of men.

MILITARY ARRIVALS.—Several hundred additional volunteers arrived in the city, to-day, from Lancaster, Schuylkill and other eastern counties.

BRIG. GEN. E. C. WILLIAMS, his aid, Col. J. J. Patterson, and Major Onslough, arrived in town to-day, from the camp at York. They represent matters there as being in a fine condition.

WAS IN TOWN.—Capt. Jones, of the regular U. S. army, in command of the Government property at Harper's Ferry, previous to its destruction by fire, was in town, this morning, stopping at the Jones' House.

THE "UPPER END IN MOTION."—A fine looking military company from Lykens town, numbering about 80 men, under the command of Capt. Savage, arrived in the city about 2 o'clock this afternoon, and are quartered at Camp Curtin.

THE "VERBES RIBB" is the name of a new military company now organizing in this city. Their "head quarters" is at the Exchange building, Walnut street, where active young men, desirous of serving their country, can have an opportunity to enroll themselves.

PACKAGES AND CLOTHING FOR OUR MILITARY.—Those of our citizens who desire to send clothing or other articles to their friends belonging to the Cameron Guards and State Capital Guards, now encamped at York, are requested to send their packages to the office of George W. Buehler, Esq., at the Buehler House, to-morrow, where arrangements have been made to have them safely transported to York.

WE UNDERSTAND that the immense culinary resources of the State Lunatic Hospital, near this city, have been placed at the disposal of the Government, and that during the last week the attaches of that establishment, under the Superintendence of Dr. Curwin and the estimable matron Mrs. Will, have been engaged night and day cooking meat and boiling coffee for the soldiers at Camp Curtin.

THE HARRISBURG TROOPS.—Capt. Wm. B. Sipes, of the State Capital Guards, was in the city last night. He reports that his company and the Cameron Guards, with the other troops that left this city last Saturday night, still remain encamped at York. The Guards are reported to be enjoying good health, and in the best possible spirits.

Capt. Eyster and Lieut. Davis of the Cameron Guards were also in the city this morning on a visit to their families. They looked well, and spoke very encouragingly of their company.

PISTOL THEFT.—A negro named James Clark, alias "Clem," was arrested this morning on a warrant issued by the Mayor charged with stealing a revolver from Capt. George Rinehart of the Eighth Pennsylvania regiment of volunteers. The pistol was recovered by the police, and the owner declining to prosecute, the negro was discharged from custody with an injunction to "sin no more."

THE MARINE CAMERON GUARDS, Capt. J. Congdon, numbering 80 men, rank and file, arrived in town yesterday afternoon and are quartered at Camp Curtin. Capt. Congdon was formerly a resident of this city, and is a son-in-law of Wm. T. Bishop, Esq. He will give a good account of himself when the proper moment arrives.

ADVISED MEETING.—An adjourned meeting of the citizens of Harrisburg, will be held at the Court House, (Brant's Hall,) at 7 o'clock, this evening, for the purpose of hearing the report of the ward Committees on the formation of a Committee of Public Safety.

FIRST ENGLISH LUTHERAN CHURCH.—The notice in yesterday's TELEGRAPH concerning the First English Lutheran and the Old School Presbyterian churches, was premature. Such an arrangement was spoken of but not agreed upon, as the services of the pastor of the Lutheran church may be required in behalf of the troops to be quartered in that building.

THE THIRD BRIGADE.—Brigade Inspector Jonas Loudenschlager has issued his orders for the companies composing the Third Brigade, Fifth Division, Pa. Volunteers, to meet for inspection at Uniontown, on Friday, the 17th of May, at 10 o'clock, A. M. The companies are required to parade thirty-two men each, and to be in readiness to march at one day's notice when called upon by the Commander-in-chief.

VIOLATION OF ORDINANCES.—There was quite a rush of business at the Mayor's office this morning, caused by the arrest of no less than eight countrymen, charged with violating an Ordinance of the city requiring them to unhitch their horses from their market wagons during market hours. Each of the parties were fined one dollar and costs, which they paid, and were then discharged.

Information has been made against Mr. A. G. Keet, also charged with violating a city Ordinance, by emptying the contents of a chaff bed in the streets. A hearing of the case will probably take place before the Mayor this evening.

THE CORNER at Third and Market streets, seems to be the regularly constituted depot for the arrival and departure of omnibuses and other vehicles running to and from "Camp Curtin," and the bustle and confusion almost hourly visible in that quarter will remind one very forcibly of the palmy days of omnibuses in Philadelphia. There are some eight or ten omnibuses on the line, besides an infinite number of carriages and other vehicles, all of which are abundantly patronized.

DUST, OR!—The streets of our city, and particularly Third street, abound with dust, which, stirred by the wheels of passing vehicles, rises in dense volumes, filling the eyes, ears and noses of pedestrians in the most provoking manner. A "peck of dust before death" is man's portion; but Sanders, in his generosity, seems determined to give us a bushel.
