

WASHINGTON SAFE.

We doubt not that the safety of Washington city is now secured, says the Bulletin of last night. The railroad from Annapolis to Baltimore is in the hands of the Federal Government, and it is believed that the rails that had been removed have been relaid by this time. The road will be well guarded along its whole length, and will be used for transporting troops and supplies. By this time it is probable that several thousand good and well disciplined volunteers have been added to the troops in Washington city, and communication with the Northern States through Maryland will be kept up, no matter what the Baltimore mob may say on the subject. If any serious obstruction should be offered, the Government may compel Baltimore herself to allow a free Reply of the President to the passage through her own streets. There is power enough to do it, and but little more provocation is needed.
