It was announced yesterday morning that the Baltimore and Ohio Bailroad, through the permission of Gen. Scott, would run a train of cars to Washington and back, for the conveyance of the mails and for the accommodation of persons wishing to travel between the The Railroad Track near Annaptwo cities. Accordingly a train was got in readiness about noon at the Camden station. and a large number of persons purchased tickets for Washington. They were mostly those who had been turned back in the train Five Thousand More Troops Moving of Wednesday, and many having families in Washington were anxious to reach there to look after their safety. There was also an immense amount of mail matter sent off from the No Attack on Washington Permitted post office, including the back mails of the several newspapers of the city. The train started at a quarter to 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon, under the charge of Conductor Showacre, and proceeded on without interruption to Jessop's Cut, near the Annapolis Junction, when Federal soldiers were found lining the road at every point, and it was deemed best not to proceed lest the train should be seized. The engine was reversed, and the train run back to this city, reaching here early last evening, and bringing back passengers and mails. Several of the passengers left the train at the point of interruption, and would attempt to reach Washington by some means. SPECIAL SESSION OF THE MARYLAND

GEN. CAMERON AND GOV. LETCHER.

PERRYVILLE, April 27.

It was reported that a dispatch had been received by Governor Letcher from Mr. Cameron, Secretary of War, inquiring whether he would be protected if he came to Richmond, for the purpose of asking an armistice of sixty days.

[This may be set down as a Southern fiction. The true story about a proposad armistice is probably that given by the correspondent of the New York Times, as follows:

"A deputation of sixteen Virginians and eight Marylanders visited the Pr sident on Monday, are opposed to the exercise of that right. His and demanded a cassation of hostilities until after own convictions are opposed to the exercise of the session of Congress. Mr. Lincoln of course, declined the proposition. One of the deputation said that 75,000 Marylanders would contest the passage of troops over her soil, to which the President replied that he presumed there was room enough on her soil to bury 75,000 men. The answer was prompt and decided."

WASHINGTON ALL BIGHT.

The Eighth Massachusetts Regiment arrived at Washington yesterday at noon. The Rhods Island troops, six companies of the 5th Massachusetts, and the seventy-first New York regiment passed the Junction last night in first rate condition. The sixth, twelfth and twentylinth New York regiments are at Annapolls. There is now 1,800 troops at the Capital, and 3,000 more on the road from Annapolis. The reported tearing up of the rails on the Annapotis road is incorrect.

NO ATTACK UPON WASHINGTON FROM VIRGINIA.

J. S. Potter, of Massachusetts arrived here from Washington, which place he left last night, and brings important dispatches from Gen. Scott.
