JUDGE BURD OF THE CRIMINAL COURT DENOUNCES THE RIOT. His Charge to the Grand Jury on the Subject. THE DUTY OF THE GRAND JURY EXPLAINED. Later from Washington. UNFOUNDED RUMORS CONTRADICTED. PHILADELPHIA, May 1.

Capt. William M. Mullin, of the Independent Rangers, arrested C. A. Greiner, a secessionist from Georgia, yesterday afternoon. The arrest was made by order of General Patterson. It seems that the family of Mr. Greiner has been living in Philadelphia for some months, but he arrived only on Friday last, and put up at a private boarding house in Arch street, near Juniper.

Question—Did he state in what capacity he acted? Answer—He said that he commanded the forces which captured the Fort. Defendant—I am only a private. Witness—He said that he was about to return to Georgia—that he had come here to see his family.

Flag, which as it spread to the breeze was greeted with tremendous applause, the waving of hats, and cheers for the Union and the old flag. The crowd then joined in singing the Star Spangled Banner. Fort M'Henry has been further strengthened by the addition of four hundred United States soldiers. The latter were placed safely within the walls of the fort last night, and furnish double assurance that Baltimore will be kept in awe of the Federal power, if the authorities or the mob try to make any more trouble.

Letters received here to-day, from Paris, state that the French Government is fully posted on American affairs, and that no sympathy is felt for the Confederate traitors. All the southern journals received here to-day state that large numbers of rebel troops are gathering in the southern cities, and that free negroes are being impressed into the Confederate service.

ANNAPOLIS, April 30. Last night the entire garrison was called to arms in consequence of a discharge of cannon and rockets from Fort Madison, on the opposite side of the river. The men slept on their arms all night, expecting a demonstration from Baltimore. The camp is unusually quiet to-day.

BALTIMORE, May 1. Judge Burd of the Criminal Court to-day, in charging the Grand Jury, called their attention particularly to the attack of the mob on the military on the 19th ult., which was that the guilty may be brought to punishment. He says a riot has occurred in our midst, and a state of things since continued to exist, which demands thorough investigation at your hands for the punishment of crime and the vindication of the good name of this city.

WASHINGTON, May 5. Orders have been issued to the commanders of regiments and independent companies to make their reports to the head-quarters department of Washington, stating among other things the strength of their commands, the character of their arms, the supply of ammunition, the degree of proficiency of their drills and the character of the same; if they understand the drill as skirmishers, if they have practiced at the target and the range and proficiency thereof, and if they know the manual of the bayonet exercise.

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
