IMPORTANT FROM BEDFORD. Movement of Pennsylvania Volunteers to Cumberland.

[SPECIAL DISPATCH TO THE TELEGRAPH.] Bedford, June 26. It is understood here to-night, that General McClellan has telegraphed to Governor Curtin for the movement of troops to Cumberland, and that General McCall has ordered the two regiments encamped in this vicinity, to march to Cumberland to-morrow.

The order creates great activity in camp, and the boys seem delighted with the idea of a brush with the rebels.

LATEST FROM WASHINGTON. MORE SENSATION RUMORS. NO PEACE PROPOSITIONS OFFERED!

Rebel and Federal Pickets Drinking Together. WASHINGTON, June 25. The recent fears that some treacherous compromise was being hatched appear to have been unfounded, as there is high authority for stating that no peace propositions have been offered to our Government by the rebels. On the contrary, renewed assurances have been received that the traitors intend to push the war to the bitter end.

A company of New Yorkers are here, urging the acceptance of the regiment of "American Riflemen," the command of which has been tendered to Major Ben Ferley Poore, of the Massachusetts Eighth.

Our pickets and those of the rebels, appear to be taking things coolly. Some of them laid down their arms and went and took liquid refreshments together.

The Second Wisconsin Regiment arrived to-day. They presented rather a faded appearance. All reports from the vicinity of the Potomac, represent things ever there dull to-day.

Active Movements in Western Virginia. PROSPECTS OF A BATTLE. CINCINNATI, June 25. A special despatch to the Gazette, dated Grant yesterday, says it is considered certain that a body of five thousand rebels are in camp thirteen miles beyond Philippi. This force includes at least one Georgia and one Tennessee regiment. All are said to be uniformed and armed. Potterfield's troops and others, numbering some three thousand, are kept back at Huttonsville. Skirmishing continues between the pickets.

The Sixth Indiana and Fourteenth Ohio Regiments are concentrating at Philippi. The Sixteenth Ohio regiment is at Cheat River, and the Eighth and Tenth Indiana regiments are at Clarksburg. It is rumored that all the Secessionist forces excepting one hundred cavalry, have left Romney.

About twenty prisoners were discharged to-day; most of them voluntarily taking the oath of allegiance. Coles Kelly and Darow, who were detailed to examine prisoners, have decided that they will hold the traitors with the intention of turning them over to the civil authorities for trial for treason, except in the case of Govey, who will be shot.

IMPORTANT SOUTHERN NEWS. Virginia May Secede from the Rebel Confederacy. LOUISVILLE, June 25. A reliable gentleman from Nashville, who arrived yesterday, reports that two regiments of Tennessee troops were under marching orders for Knoxville.

There are great hopes that the election in the First Congressional District has gone in favor of the Union candidate. McCracken county is reported, by a gentleman from there, to have given 247 majority for the Union. The news comes in slowly.

Produce shippers here are about contesting the legality of the blockade of the Nashville Railroad. The case will be argued on Wednesday.

Letters in the Charleston Mercury commend that paper for having the moral courage to resent the insult offered to South Carolina by a gentleman named Russell, the correspondent of the London Times.

A special despatch to the New Orleans Picayune, dated Richmond, June 20, says that the Convention has adopted an amendment to the Constitution of the Confederate States, giving the right to Virginia to secede on certain contingencies.

RECESS OF THE MARYLAND LEGISLATURE. FREDERICK, Md., June 25. The Legislature of Maryland took another recess to-day adjourning to the 30th of July, to meet again on that day at Frederick.

Three Days Later from Europe. The London Times on American Affairs. A SQUADRON ORDERED TO THE NORTH AMERICAN COAST.

Recognition of Italy by France. FRANCE AND AUSTRIA—WAR INDICATIONS. KOSSUTH AT LOMBARDY.

THE POPE SERIOUSLY ILL. AFFAIRS IN SPAIN AND DENMARK. New York, June 25.

The steamer Europa has arrived from Liverpool with advices to the 15th. GREAT BRITAIN.—In the House of Lords on the 13th inst., Mr. Marquis, of Normandy, in the interest of the Galway line, moved for returns of breaches of contract by various mail packet companies during the first two years of their existence, and penalties inflicted. Agreed to.

In the House of Commons on the same evening, Mr. Gregory put inquiries to Ministers on the same subject. Mr. Gregory moved the appointment of a select committee to inquire into the circumstances attending the termination of the Galway contract. He charged the British Government with being actuated by an envious spirit towards Ireland.

The Times, in an editorial on American affairs, and the indignation of the north towards the attitude of England, asserts that the British public have given much sympathy to the federal cause—more than they ever gave to the cause of British sovereignty and union in any of its trials. It claims that England will do her duty, and leave the federalists to do theirs, knowing well that she could not do them a greater mischief than by taking their part.

The recognition of Italy by France is near at hand, and will be hastened by Cavour's death. The Journal des Debats publishes an important article showing that if Austria crosses the Minio, France must inevitably recommence the war interrupted in 1859.

ITALY.—The new ministry had taken the oath of allegiance. It was stated that Kossuth was about to take a permanent residence in Lombardy. Baron Ricasoli, in announcing the formation of the new ministry, said that none had lost their faith in the destiny of Italy. The policy of the new Cabinet, he said, would be the same as that of Cavour. The Pope was seriously ill.

AUSTRIA.—In the Hungarian chamber of deputies, on the fourteenth instant, the address to the Emperor having been revised, it was finally agreed to.

SPAIN.—Spanish journals publish advices from St. Domingo that tranquillity and enthusiasm for the Spanish government reign throughout the island.

DENMARK.—At the election of members for the folkething, the ministerial candidates were successful.

WESTERN ARMY MOVEMENTS. CINCINNATI, June 25. The Tenth Ohio Regiment, Col. Lytle, left Camp Dennison yesterday afternoon, for Western Virginia, and the sixth and seventh regiments will probably leave to-morrow.

The troops remaining at Camp Dennison are the fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth, eleventh, twelfth and thirteenth regiments, numbering over 6,000 men. The First and Second Kentucky Regiments will remove their quarters to Camp Dennison to-day, swelling the number to 8,000 men.

Patrick Kenney was shot and instantly killed last night, by policeman Purcell, for interfering in an arrest.

The gun boat A. O. Tyler, dropped down the river yesterday afternoon, and the Lexington and Conestoga will leave to-day.

THE PIRATES AT NEW YORK. NEW YORK, June 25. Capt. Baker and crew of privateer Savannah arrived here to-day in the steamer Harriet Lane from Hampton roads, and were immediately arrested by District Attorney Smith, charged with treason, piracy and robbery on the high seas. Capt. Livingston, of the brig Joseph, who was seized by these pirates, is here as a witness. The case will be taken before the grand jury to-morrow, and the case will be tried early next week.

The Vermont regiment left here this evening for Washington.

THE REBEL CONGRESS. FREDERICK, June 25. The Virginia secession convention, still in session at Richmond, have elected a number of members to the Confederate Congress. The following gentlemen are among those chosen: Ex-President Tyler, Walter Preston, Robert A. Scott, Wm. Ballard Preston, Ex-Senator Mason and Roger A. Fryor.
