POLITICS IN CALIFORNIA.

GOV. DOWNEY DECLINES A NOMINATION BY THE DEMOCRATS.

A ROTTEN PLATFORM.

Failure of the No-party Movement.

Old Political Organizations to be Maintained.

[Arrival of the Pony Express.]

From Sacramento to Fort Kearney, June 26.

The California Pony Express passed here at 11 A. M., yesterday.

The general character of news to go forward is of trifling importance. The Breckinridge State Convention adjourned without making any nomination.

This result was unexpected to the members of the party, and seems to have been brought about by two causes. First, the hope of uniting the North against Lincoln and his war policy.

Secondly, the inability to fix upon their standard bearer for the coming contest.

The copy of the platform of the Convention and also a tender of the nomination of Governor Downey was telegraphed to Governor Downey, at Los Angeles, and his reply was as follows:

An express from Bunker Hill has just arrived.

Eight thousand rebel troops were lying there and at various points along the Potomac river between Hancock and Harper's Ferry. Including Jackson's force, he has five regiments.

Including Jackson's force, he has five regiments, it being a general impression among them that a reaction will take place in popular sentiment within the next four or five weeks.

Another regiment, number unknown, with four pieces of artillery, are with General Jackson, commanded by Capt. Pendleton.

The President has appointed Mr. W. Murphy, of Michigan, Consul at Frankfort-on-the-Main, and Richard Hildreth, of New York, Consul at Martinsburg, with three pieces of artillery.

Gen. Johnson is fortifying Winchester. A battery is being raised on a wooded hill overlooking the Fair Grounds. When he evacuated Harper's Ferry the whole column went to Charlestown and thence to Bunker Hill, where he was on Sunday when Gen. Patterson's column crossed the river. The whole rebel force

met again on the 23d of July, at the same point, and again on the 24th.

Gen. Johnson's force is at Winchester, and his reply was as follows:

Another regiment, number unknown, with four pieces of artillery, are with General Jackson, commanded by Capt. Pendleton.

Gen. Jackson's force returned to Winchester.

Gen. Jackson's force of 8000 has marched towards the Potomac.

Gen. Johnson's force at Winchester does not exceed 10,000, unless reinforcements have arrived there since Sunday.

Major Doubleday's battery threw round shot and shell this evening towards the house where the rebel pickets are stationed opposite Williamsport.

The guard were at supper when the ball was opened, but quickly left their food unfinished and made their escape.

Major Doubleday's battery is now in position, the adjoining woods.

The plan of the rebels seems to be to draw Gen. Patterson's column into Virginia and then retreat, fighting only at those points where a chance for successful resistance to the Federal troops can be made.

That the President's message at the opening of the extra session of Congress will recommend a compromise having for its object the reconciliation of those now in arms against the Federal Government, no one at all acquainted with the views of the administration believes.

On the contrary it will doubtless be found that the course already initiated will be firmly maintained, in consonance with the inaugural address, and on this, as on all other subjects, the administration is one, undivided and indivisible.

It is intimated in well informed circles that the Administration is in receipt of very favorable advice from the other side of the Atlantic.
