**BY TELEGRAPH.**  
XKX with Congress Extra Session  
July 29, 1861

On motion of Mr. WILSON, another committee of conference was appointed.

Mr. HALE, (N. H.) reported, from the Committee of Conference, on the bill to appoint an assistant Secretary of the Navy. The report was agreed to and the bill passed. Also the report of the Committee of Conference on the bill increasing the Medical Corps of the Navy. The report was agreed to and the bill stands passed.

Mr. HARRIS (N. Y.) from the Committee of the Judiciary, reported a bill for the suppression of the sale of intoxicating liquors in the District of Columbia. The bill provides that no person shall sell intoxicating liquors to the soldiers of the United States under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offence. The bill was passed.

Mr. TAYLOR, from the Committee on the Judiciary, reported a bill requiring the oath of allegiance to be administered to all persons employed by the Government. Passed.

Mr. WILSON, from the Committee on Military Affairs, reported back the bill for the purchase of arms, ordnance and ordnance stores, making an appropriation of \$1,000,000. Passed.

Mr. SAULSBURY, (Del.) offered a resolution requesting the Secretary of War to inform the Senate whether any arms have been sent to the State of Delaware since the first of July, and if so how many, and what for. Laid over.

Mr. TAYLOR, (Ill.) from the Committee on the Judiciary, reported back the memorials of the Police Commissioners of Baltimore, confined in Fort McHenry; also the memorials of the Mayor and Common Councils of Baltimore, with a resolution that the Committee be discharged.

Mr. BAYARD, (Del.) offered an amendment to a resolution that the police commissioners ought to be surrendered to the civil authority on some charge, or be discharged and permitted to resume to their duties; and also that Marshal Kane ought to be delivered to the civil authorities on some charge, or be discharged.

Mr. TAYLOR thought it was not in order to make such a motion as that of the Senator from Delaware.

Mr. FESSENDEN moved to lay the whole subject on the table, but modified it so as to postpone until to-morrow. Agreed to.

The tariff bill was taken up, the question being on the amendment providing for a tax of 5 per cent on all incomes over \$1,000, except on incomes derived from government securities, which were taxed by 2 per cent, which was agreed to.

viding for the appointment of a board to scale, equalize and reduce the compensation of all officers of the government, and to report a bill for that purpose at the next session. Passed.

On motion of Mr. WASHINGTON, the House took up and passed Senate bill in addition to the report act further to provide for the collection of duties on imports. Adjourned.

**Starling Movements in Missouri.**  
**REBELS CAPTURED AT HICKORY HILL.**  
**THE STATE CONVENTION.**

ROLLA, Mo., July 27.  
A fight took place on Thursday, on Lane's Prairie, fifteen miles from here, between a party of sixty-five rebels and fifteen Home Guards from Rolla.

The Guards were surrounded, but they made a determined stand and after a few volleys, dispersed the rebels, killing their First Lieutenant and mortally wounding three privates. One lieutenant and two privates on our side were slightly wounded.

JACKSON CITY, July 28.—The detachment of two companies of Col. Milligan's regiment and three companies of the Home Guards sent to Hickory Hill near Mount Pleasant, in Cole County, were fired on from an ambush near that place, but no one was hit. They captured twenty-eight rebels, among them two captains of Jackson's forces; also, forty horses and two teams, which have been brought to this city.

Since the withdrawal of the Federal forces from Callaway county, opposite here, the rebels are again concentrating. Four hundred are reported to-day at Fulton. Trouble is feared from there and from Harris's forces.

JACKSON CITY, July 28.—The revised report of the Committee of Eight, in the State Convention, strikes out that clause in the former report relating to the Supreme Judges.

While it declares vacant the Executive and Legislative departments, it ordains that an election for these officers shall be held on the first Monday of November next; also that the action of the Convention be submitted to the people; at the same time a separate poll book is to be opened, and two tickets are to be struck off; one for the action of the Convention, the other against the action of the Convention.

Should a majority decide for the action then the officers elected shall take their seats; if against its action, then the said election to be null and void, and the officers elected shall not take their seats, and the officers appointed by the Convention shall go out of office, and the ordinance providing for the abrogation of certain acts of the Legislature shall be null and void. It also declares vacant all the offices to which appointments were made by Gov. Jackson, and also provides for the appointment of officers at the election in case any of those regularly elected refuse to serve.

**FROM HARPER'S FERRY.**  
**MOVEMENT OF GEN. BANKS.**  
BALTIMORE, July 29.  
The American of this morning learns that Gen. Banks, immediately on taking command of the forces at Harper's Ferry, commenced the removal of the army stores and provisions to the Maryland side, at a point in Frederick county, about three miles from Sandy Hook. The construction of the bridge was also stopped, and preparations made for evacuating the place, which is by no means defensible from attack, either from the Virginia or the Maryland side.

By the cars from the Ferry, the same paper learns that General Banks, on Saturday and yesterday, withdrew his troops to the Maryland side, and formed his camp in a strong position in the rear of the Maryland Heights, to which point his pickets will extend. He is being rapidly reinforced, and will soon have a large army under his command. It is said that several of the Pennsylvania reserve regiments were yesterday ordered to that point, and an Indiana and Pennsylvania regiment passed through this city on Saturday for the same destination. It is rumored that General Johnson has returned with his command to Winchester, and will probably commence offensive demonstrations along the Maryland line.

**ESCAPE OF PRISONERS FROM MANASSAS**  
**The Rebel Soldiers Shouting "On to Washington."**

**MARYLAND STATE PRISONERS TO GO TO FORT MONROE**  
**THE DIRECT TAX BILL**  
**THE FORTHCOMING LOAN**  
**CAPTURE OF REBEL SOLDIERS**

WASHINGTON, July 29.  
The evacuation of Harper's Ferry, and its motives, are well understood here. We may say the same of the evacuation of the village of Hampton, by our forces.

Captain William Allen, of the Eleventh Massachusetts; E. P. Dougherty, of the New York Seventy-first; and Orlando Waldorf, of the Second Wisconsin, arrived here to-day. They escaped from Manassas.

They say the rebels lost 1,600 killed and wounded. They could get no idea of the future movements of the rebels, though the rebel soldiers were enthusiastically shouting "On to Washington."

The rebels refused to bury the slain of the Fourteenth New York and the Fire Zouaves. The Police Commissioners, Marshal Kane, and other State prisoners now at Fort McHenry will be this afternoon sent to Fort Monroe, by order of the Government.

The bill before the House for direct taxation and internal duties is to be amended by the reduction of the land tax, and the amount will be levied on other things.

Ample provision will be made for the raising of the interest on the forthcoming loan. Captain Tomlin's Cavalry captured twenty-nine rebel soldiers, south of Arlington, this morning.
