The acts specified by you certainly constitute "trading with the enemy" peculiarly objectionable, because they afford a direct assistance to the enemy by the transmission of money to foster his resources. And, in addition, such conduct is highly unpatrious, because directly zens of our Confederacy, whose obligations are thus withdrawn from the enemy's country where it is for the interest of such States that they should remain, since they could not there be called upon for payment during the war. Such operations are certainly worse than the simple purchase of merchandise in the enemy's country, because they, at the same time, aid our memies and injure our friends.
