WHAT A STRANGER SAYS OF HARRISBURG.—A correspondent of the National Republican of Washington, D. C., on his travels through Pennsylvania, thus alludes to our city:

Before leaving Harrisburg, we took a genersalthy part of the city, the ground laying very igh. It is a very delightful spot, particularly in the summer season. The grounds upon which the State House and adjacent buildings are built, cover a space of ten or twelve acres, all of which is beautifully laid out, having an all of which is beautifully laid out, having an abundance of fine shade trees, and enclosed by a neat iron railing. In the centre of these grounds is the State House itself, a very substantial looking building, two stories in height, about 150 fact in length and 70 in width.
