### SPECIAL PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR.

THOR

OFFICE SECRETARY OF THE COMMONWEALTH, Harrisburg, Sept. 18, 1861. The following provisions in case any of the militia or volunteers shall be in actual services at the time of the general election" are published for the benefit of 'those citizens' of 'Poinsylvania to whom they may apply in connection with the general election to be held on the sec ond Tuesday of October, A. D. 1861:

Whenever any of the citizens of this Commonwealth qualified as hereinbefore provided shall be in any actual military service in any detachment of the militia or corps of volunteers, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this commonwealth, on the day of the general election, as aforesaid, such citizens may exercise the right of suffrage at such places as may be appeared by the pointed by the commanding officer of the troop, or company, to which they shall respectively belong, as fully as if they were present at the usual place of election. Provided, That no member of any such troop or company, shall

be permitted to vote at the place as appointed, it at the time of such election be shall be with in ten miles of the place at which he would be entitled to vote, if not in service as aforesaid.

The proceedings for conducting such elections shall be as far as practicable, in all respects the same as are herein directed in the case of general elections, except that the captain or com-manding officer of each company or troop shall act as judge, and that the first lieutenant or of

neer second in command, shall act as inspector, at such election, so far as shall relate to such company or troop; and in case of the neglect or retusal of such officers, or either of them, to serve in such capacity, the officer or officers next in command, in such company or troop, shall act as judge or inspector as the case may be The officer authorized to perform the duties

or judge, shall administer the proper oath or affirmation to the officer who shall act as, in-spector, and as soon as such officer shall have en swom or affirmed, he shall administer the proper cath or affirmation to the officer whose duty it shall be to set as judge, and such officer cting as judge shad appoint two persons to ac as clerks, and shall administer to them the proper oaths or affirmations.
The several officers authorized to conduct

such elections shall take the like oaths or affir mations, shall have the like powers, and they, as well as other persons who may attend, vote, or offer to vote, at such election, shall be subject to the like penalties and restrictions as are declared or provided in this act, in the case of elections by the citizens at their usual places of

Within three days after such election, the judges thereof shall respectively transmit through the nearest post office, a return thereof together with the tickets, tally lists of voters, to the prothonotary of the county in which such electors would have voted, if not in military service. And the said judges shall transmit another return of such election to the commanding officer of the regiment or battallion. as the case may be, who shall make a general return under his hand and seal, of the votes of all the companies or troops under his command and shall transmit the same through the near est post office to the secretary of the common

It shall be the duty of the prothonotary of the county, to whom such returns shall be made, to deliver to the return judges of the same county, a copy certified under his hand and seal of the return of votes so transmitted to him by the judges of the election in the companies or troops aforesaid.

The Cincinnati Commercial, of last Tuesday contains the following under its editorial head "THE DEATH OF GEN. BEAUREGARD."

A gentleman who has left New Orleans a few A gentleman who has left New Orleans a few days since, yesterday handed us the communication which appears under this heading in another column. He is thosoughly convinced that Beauregard is dead, and is confident that his information is from sources of the most trustworthy character. We are of the opinion that he has been misled by persons who have drawn upon their imagination for the facts.—
It is certain, however, that a rumor of Beauregard's death has given rise to much gossip in New Orleans. The Southern mind is in such a condition, fed as it has been by the wildest fancondition, fed as it has been by the widest fan-cies, and wrought up to a pitch of excitement bordering upon insanity, and there is no story however improbable, that is not credited, and "trifles light as air" afford "confirmation strong as proof of holy writ."

The communication referred to is as follows: Permit me through the columns of you paper to make the above announcement, it is indeed, true that the rebel general is no more ne died some three weeks since in the city of New Orleans, Louisison.

How I became acquainted with this fact must in a great measure, be hidden from th public, as it would involve many persons still obliged to remain in the south, in; great danger. In fact they would loss their lives were lead divulge the modes operandiby which I ob-

tained my information. By some strange fortune or other, the name of Beautegard carries with it a great moral force, both north and south. I cannot conceive wny, for he, certainly, was not a man of supe rior ability; but he did obtain an influence se great that the north leared him more than any other man in the piratical rebel ranks; and the south hoped more from him than any other person of their traitor horde. Therefore, his ous to the rebels is irreparable, as tending to dishearten their army; white it necessarily

would be of advantage to the Union cause.
If it were generally known that their ables sader was dead, the hopes of the rascals would die also, and one half of the great battle for the Union would be accomplished merely by the diffusion of this knowledge.

Thus I am anxious to give publicity to this fact, knowing it must have a good effect. And the Confederates are equally anxious to have it kept secret, as its promalgation would be terribly detrimental to their interests. According to their own report, the bursting of a shell killed Beauregard's horse, and also the horses of two of his aids—and I saw exhibited in a shop two of his aids—and I saw exhibited in a shop window, in New Orleans, a piece of the identical shell which did all this mischief. A few days after the battle of Manassas, Dr.

Stone, of New Orleans, the most distinguished surgeon in the Southern country, and named Surgeon General in the Confederate army; was salled to Virginia, ostensibly for the purpose of superintending the sugical operations there, but really to attend personally to the case of Beauregard himself, who was severely wounded in several places by fragments of shell, two discose of which it became impossible to extract; and so Beauregard, being dopmed to die of his wounds, was brought to New Orleans as privately as possible—it merely being known that a wounded soldier was being carried to his home, no one suspecting it was Beauregard.

Dr. Stone accompanied him and managed to have him taken to his house by night. Never-theless there were eyes which saw this opera-tion. For several subsequent nights, four of the most skillful physicians of New Orleans. were seen to enter Beauregard's house—remain-some time—and then steathfily depart. On inquiry, it was stated that one of the servants was sick, but in a day or two the same servant was seen in the street, and yet the physicians still paid their nocturnal visits to the house, a usual. Further inquiry elicited the fact that Beauregard was lying at the point of death; a day or two farther on the delegation of physicians ceased their visits, and one night a body was carried out and surreptitiously disposed of That was the end of the famous Beauregard. He has fought his last battle. Bull Run finish-
