In this respect, they carry out their violations of all that is honorable and just, by engaging in the work of sequestrating all lands, goods, and securities belonging to northerners, held in any of the southern rebelstates. The indebtedness of the south, in the north, has always been enormous in amount, and at all times the loss by open repudiation and systematic swindling has been one of the heavy burdens imposed on the northern mechanic and producer by the influences growing out of the peculiar condition of society at the south.
