Prince Napoleon Sends an Important State Paper on American Affairs to the Emperor of France. St. Johns, Oct. 19. The steamship Etina arrived off Cape Race at 10 o'clock on Friday night, bringing Liverpool dates to the 9th and Queenstown of the 10th inst.—four days later than those per Arabia. The steamship Anglo Saxon, from Quebec, arrived at Liverpool on the 8th inst. It was reported that Prince Napoleon had sent the Emperor an important State paper on American affairs. Hon. Robert M. Palmer. Extract of a letter from Hon. Robert M. Palmer, Minister of the United States to the Argentine Confederation, South America, to his wife, dated "Buenos Aires, August 22, 1861.—We landed in this city on the 6th inst., but the impending civil war between this province and the government of the Confederation has so entirely broken up the river communication with Parana, that we have been compelled to request Commander Macomb, of the United States steamer Pulaski, to proceed with us with his vessel to Parana. This he has promptly and kindly agreed to do, but has been delayed at Montevideo for several days, waiting for the arrival of necessary stores from Rio Janeiro. These supplies have been received, and we are expecting the Pulaski here to-day or to-morrow, when we shall start at one for Parana. "We have sent a large package of letters for friends in Pottsville and elsewhere, containing the details of our voyage, &c., with a box to you containing a few of the curious things of this country, by the English vessel Montezuma, for New York, in care of Messrs. Tapscott & Co.; but I have concluded to send this short letter by the English steamer to apprise you, perhaps, earlier of our whereabouts and condition. I am still feeble and suffering with fever, but on the whole, I think I am improving, and have great hopes for the approaching spring weather; this is winter now, and some days are chilly and unpleasant. "Strange (his son) is fat and hearty, 143 pounds weight. Chesley Bass (his servant, a Philadelphia man) is in good health, and a faithful, useful man. "We received grandpa's welcome letter of the 17th June, with packages of newspapers, by the late English steamer. How gladly they were received, and how eagerly we shall look to every steamer that arrives for your letters and the newspapers sent by you and from the publishers. I hope the boys will preserve and send all the newspapers in which they find anything likely to interest us. "Our American and English friends here, are all kind and attentive, and we found our letters of introduction very useful. "In great love, "Your affectionate husband, "ROBERT M. PALMER."

Stampede of Slaves.—New Creek, Va., Oct. 18.—Six slaves from near Romney came into camp to-day. They were pursued until within six miles of our camp by the rebel cavalry, who were after the reward that had been offered for them, which was \$600. As soon as they came in eighty of our cavalry went into hot pursuit, but the rebels hearing they were pursued, retreated to Romney. The negroes reported 4,000 rebels at that place. We are 1,200 strong here, with one 12-pound gun, and Capt. Butterfield with his Ohio regiment, is being a very formidable force. So you see we will soon be ready for them.—Cor. of the Cincinnati Commercial.
