PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 22. This morning, about 7 o'clock, a fire broke out n the drying house attached to the extensive nanufacturing establishment known as the 'Pekin Mills," under the management of Mr. Solms, located near the Schuylkill, at the upper end of Manayunk. The building, which was of stone, and three stories in height, contained a large quantity of wool which was in process of drying. The material was dried by means of hot air which passed through iron slatted floors. The flames spread with great rapidtime, the destruction of the main buildings seemed inevitable; but by hard work, good management and good fortune the catastrophe

was averted. The mills which are run by water power, are largely engaged in the manufacture of army cloths, and they are kept going night and day, employing about two hundred hands. At the time of the discovery of the fire there was a full force of workmen on the spot, and by means of buckets and the ample supply of water at hand the men were enabled to keep the flames in check until the arrival of the Manayunk firemen. These exertions were rendered available by the favorable direction of the wind. A breeze from a westerly direction would have driven the fire directly into the ain buildings, and the entire range of
