

EXISTING DRUNKEN MEN—It has been judicially decided in Boston that a contract of enlistment does not bind a man if he was drunk when he entered into it. The case came before Judge Dewey on the petition of Mary Finn, for the discharge of her husband, a soldier in the regular army, on the ground that at the time of enlistment he was so drunk as not to know what he was doing, and that as soon as he became sober, he repudiated the act and asked to be relieved from his obligation. These allegations were sustained by evidence, and the Judge held that an enlistment was but a contract between the government and the individual, that it implied an assenting mind on the part of the individual, and that a person so drunk as not to know what he was about was incapable of legal assent. The court accordingly ordered the discharge of the man. This ruling is of general application, and it should admonish recruiting officers not to enlist any man when intoxicated.
