General Beauregard has made his official report of the battle of Manassas Plains, on the 21st of July. We find the following synopsis in a letter to the Richmond Dispatch:

I have been favored with a brief synopsis of portions of General Beauregard's report of the battle of Manassas, which has been forwarded to the War Department, and which will doubt-less be published in a short time. Gen. Beaure-gard opens with a statement of his position antecedent to the battle, and of the plan proposed by him to the Government of the junction of the armies of the Shenandoah and Potomac, with a view to the relief of Maryland, and the cap-ture of the city of Washington, which plan was rejected by the President.
