The foe is still in the field; the country bleeds and our people grown under the influctions of a foe marked with all the characteristics of barbarian warfare, and where now are the fifty thousand and Georgia. with their shot guns in their hands there would not now be a federal hireling in the State to pollute our soil. Instead of ruined communi-ties, starving families and desolated districts, we should nave had a people bessed with pro-tection and with stores to supply the wants and necessities and comforts of life. Where are those fifty thousand? Are Missourians no longer Smith and John Wise, Eleventh; William

to avenge our wrongs and free our country Had fifty thousand men flocked to our standard we should have had a people blessed with protrue to themselves? Are they a timid, timeserving, craven race, fit only for subjection to a despot? Awake my countrymen, to a sense or what constitutes the dignity and true greathess of a people!
