The young aspirant became printer to the State, and by frugal management was soon enabled to accomplish the object nearest his heart—the establishment of his mother in a home above want, and in possession of every comfort she could desire. In a few years, they, too, with his sisters, were independent in the world: the once barefooted printer boy was in possession of affluence and wealth, surrounded by a young and affectionate family. He was a friend of the friendless, a patron of merit, and encourager of industry.
