

LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES Passed at the Second Session of the Thirty-sevent Congress.

[RESOLUTION—PUBLIC No. 1.] JOINT RESOLUTION expressive of the recog-nition by Congress of the gallant and patriot-ic services of the late Brigadier General Na-thanial Lyon, and the officers and soldiers under his command at the battle of Spring-field, Missouri

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representa-tions of the United States of America in Congress assembled, 1. That Congress deems it just and proper to enter upon its records a recognition of the eminent and patriotic services of the late Brigadier General Nathaniel Lyon. The coun-try to whose service he devoted his life will preserve his tame as a part of its own close.

preserve his same as a part of its own glory.

2. That the thanks of Congress are hereby 2. That the thanks of Congress are hereby given to the brave officers and soldiers who, under the command of the late General Lyon, spatially the honor of the flag and achieved victory against overwhelming numbers at the battle of Springfield, in Missouri, and that, in order to commemorate an event so honorable to the country and to themselves, it is ordered that each regiment engaged shall be authorised to bear upon its colors the word of "Springfield," embroided in letters of gold. And the President of the United States is hereby requested to cause these resolutions to be read at the head of every regiment in the army of the United States.

[Public-No. 2.] AN ACT to increase the duties on tea, coffee and sugar.

Be it engeted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That from and after the date of the passage of this act, in lieu of the duties heretofore imposed by law on articles hereinaf-ter mentioned, there shall be levied, collected ter menumed, there shall be levied, collected and paid on the goods, wares and merchandise herein enumerated and provided for, imported from foreign countries; the following duties and rates of duty, that is to say: First. On all teas, twenty cents per pound. Second. On confee of all kinds, five cents per pound. Third. On raw sugar, commonly called Muscovado or house allows. brown sugar, and on sugars not advanced above number—twelve, Dutch: standard, by claying, number twelve, Dutch standard, by claying, boiling, diarifying, or other process, and syrup of stigar or of sugar cane, and concentrated molassese or concentrated melado, two cents and a half per pound; and on white and clayed sugar, when advanced beyond the raw state, above number twelve. Dutch standard, by clarifying or other process, and not yet refined, thits cents per pound; on refined sugars, whether lost, lump, crushed or pulverized, five cents per pound; on sugars after being refined, when they are tingtured, colored, or in any way, adulterated, and on sugar candy, eight cents per pound; on molasses, six cents per gallon: Provided, That all syrups of sugar or of sugar cane, concentrated molasses or concentrated melado; entered under the name of molasses, or any other name than syrup of sugar or ses, or any other name than syrup of sugar or or of sugar cane, concentrated molasses or concentrated melado, shall be liable to forfeiture to the United States, and the same

AN ACT relative to courte martial in the army. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Repre-stations of the United States of America in Congress spembled. That in time of war the commander of a division, or separate brigade, may appoint general courts martial, and confirm, execute, pardon, and mitigate their sentances, as allowed and restrained in the sixty-fifth and eightyninth articles of war to commanders of armies and departments: Provided, That sentences of and departments: rroutes, I has sensences or such courts extending to loss of life; or dismis-sion of a commissioned officer, shall require the confirmation of the general commanding the army in the field to which the division or brigady belongs: And provided further, That when the division or brigade commander shall be the abouser or prosecutor, the court shall be appointed by the next higher commander.
