CONCLUSION OF YESTERDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.] WASHINGTON, Jan. 16. IN SENATE. On motion of Mr. Wilson, the bill in relation to the arrest of persons claimed to be held to service or labor by officers of the militia or naval service of the United States was taken up.

Mr. COLLIER, (Vt.) offered an amendment as a substitute that no officer of the army or militia, or volunteer, shall assume to exercise any authority to arrest, detain, hold or control any person on account of such being held to service, and any officer so offending shall be dismissed from the service. Agreed to.

Mr. SAUBERRY, (Del.) offered an amendment as a new section: Nor shall any soldier or officer under like penalty, any way, except by order or retain any such person in his master's or owner's hands. He said he thought that the officer or soldier of the United States ought to have nothing to do with the question at all, either way.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. After a debate of several hours, the House adjourned with the understanding that the question be taken up to-morrow at one o'clock.

MOORE REBEL TESTIMONY AS TO THE BLOCKADE.—Rebel testimony to the rigorous efficiency of the blockade of the Southern coast accumulates constantly. The latest is from the Memphis Appeal, of the 3d instant, which declares that "the risk of running the blockade at present is to great, and comparatively but few are willing to encounter the losses that are apt to follow the experiment."

MATTERS IN ST. LOUIS.—The citizens of St. Louis have all been classified, and their names registered in four classes—those who are out-and-out for the Union, those who are for it with a reservation, those who are secessionists, those who keep still and say nothing.

TRUE IRISH GRIT.—Henry O'Connor, Esq., of Muscatine, Iowa, District Attorney, and reputed to be one of the best lawyers in the State, joined the first company that was raised in that place after the war broke out, as a private. He was with the First Iowa at the battle of Wilson's Creek, and fought like a Turk. On returning home he was offered a commission—any he might choose in a regiment.
