FROM WASHINGTON.

Advance of Gen. Lander to Romney

THE BLOCKADE OF THE POTOMAC.

No French Intervention in American Affairs. Washington, Feb. 8. Further information has been received from Gen. Lander, by which it appears that having been reinforced, he marched on Thursday at the head of between seven and eight thousand troops upon the enemy at Romney. The rebel forces weae about equal to his own; they de-clined fighting, however and retreated across

the river destroying the wire bridge in the rear, running off, probably to Winchester. As heretofore stated, Gen. Lander is now in posession of Romney. Despatches received from Gen. Halleck, at head quarters say that after the reduction of thanks to willing hands and honest hearts, the fort Henry our forces proceeded up the river architectural beauty again spans the sky, over in the direction of the railroad bridge sixteen miles distant, and on the way reduced the batteries of the enemy on the other bank of that

No doubt is entertained here that our troops thoreafter took possession of the Bridge over the Tennessee river.
The United States gunboat Pinota, which has just been finished at Baltimore, arrived here to-day. She came up past the rebel batteries accompanied by the Resolute without being fired at. She will here take on board her armament and stores. Sne is in charge of Lieu-

tenant Commanding Crosby, who is highly eseemed as a naval officer. The rumor of an intended intervention of France in our affairs is contradicted to day on high authority. The usual reception at the White House wa postponed yesterday in consequence of illness

in the President's family.

Ericsson's battery is regarded here with great favor. The Navy Department has ordered a thorough test of its qualities.

FROM GEN. BANKS' DIVISION

Movements of the Rebel Jackson. FREDERICK, Md., Feb. 8. The latest intelligence from the Virginia side

On Saturday a small body of the enemy were dispersed near Boliver, by a few well directed shells from our Battery on Marylaud heights. One of the shells exploded in an unoccupied dwelling.

There was considerable dissipation in town during the early part of the week, but a descent by the provost guard upon several taverns has hecked it in a considerable degree.

CAMP WOOD, ON THE BANKS OF GREEK RIVER, Hart County, Ky. Feb. 8, 1862.

MR. EDITOR: As a Pennsylvanian my thoughts
often return to my native State, and sometimes long to enjoy once more the pure air of her free native hills, her wooded mountains and lovely sequestered valleys, and above all to behold again the taces of cherished loved ones that I left behind when I entered upon the dutter of falting part in the great and mother iles of taking part in the great and mighty struggle of freedom against slavery, and lib-

erty against despotism.

The Pennsylvania Regiments in Kentucky have been favored above all others by the have been havored above all others by the health of their men, comparitively lew of them are numbered among the dead. They have passed through the ordeal of a powerful acclimation, with constitutions unimpaired, their mation, with constitutions unimpaired, their bodies strong and vigorous, and ready for the great and impending conflict soon to take place here. Especially has the 77th regiment, Pa. Vol., with whom I am connected, enjoyed un-

Vol., with whom I am counected, enjoyed uninterrupted health and prosperity. The offic rein command spare no pains to render the man as comfortable as this inhospitable climate of mud, mire and enow will admit of.

But the Indiana and Illinois regiments in our brigade have been very much decimated, and hundreds of them sleep their last lakep; they have fought their last battle, and many of them are now resting in graves consecrated to freedom on the soil of Kenturker.

McCook to visit the late battle field near Woodsonville, where our brave army gained unfading laurels, and where the rebel gaiged unfading laurels, and where the rebelt Col Ferry met a traitor's doom, and now lays with Zollicoffer and Garnett in ignominious graves. When the future historian of our disenthralled and rejuvinated country, will write its impartial history, they will be referred to as traitors to their God and country, while the graves of Lyon and Ellsworth will forever remain shrines where the votaries of liberty will make their pilgrimages as devotedly as does the devout Moslem to his reloved Mecca.

It passing over the pontoon bridge I gained

In passing over the pontoon bridge I gained a most splendid view of the railroad bridge which spans the Green river at this place, perhaps the most magnificent structure of the kind in America, which had been published by incorporate flands in human shape had stroyed by incarnate flends in human shape; but the place where laid an unwieldly and unsightly. heap of ruins. About a week ago a locomotive with a train of cars, passed over into secession-dom amidst the vociferous cheers of our brave

soldiers. I visited the earthworks which the rebels had thown up on the South side of the Green river; they are diminutive in alse and mean in appearance, fit now only as hiding places for owls and bats, and only left standing as a small monument to show the consummate folly of rebel-

lion. Our own works extend for about a mile, in the form of a cresent, guarding the Green river bridge; they are well planned and admirably executed. We arrived on the battle-field near midday; all that marks the spot are some dead horses and shattered trees. A few ominous birds took flight at our approach. Solemn silence now reigns over these fields which a few weeks ago resounded with the clash of arms in mighty conflict. I picked up a few relics and then returned to camp.

You and your readers may ask me, what are you doing in Kentucky? Let the battle at Woodsonville and Mill Spring answer. Grant Barring Grant Committee of the Powling Grant Committee of th Buell is advancing firmly on to Bowling Green. The result of the battle at Mill Springs renders his work far less uncertain than before, and he too may electrify the country by the intelligence of a great victory any hour.
