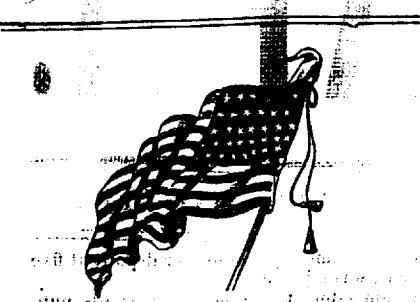

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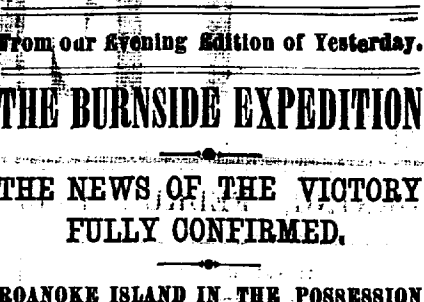
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RECEIVED IN RICHMOND.

A courier arrived here yesterday afternoon about three o'clock, from which we gather the following information: The enemy advanced in full force upon Elizabeth City yesterday at about seven o'clock, and began an attack upon that place.

It is said that before our boats surrendered, they were abandoned, and their crews succeeded in making their escape. (If it were not for the loss to conjecture why they were not fired before abandoned.)

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LATER FROM EUROPE.

ARRIVAL OF THE TEUTONIA.

The U. S. Gunboat Tuscarora Ordered from the Southampton Docks.

The Pirates Nashville Still at Southampton.

St. John, N. F., Feb. 12.

The steamer Teutonia, from Southampton, with dates to the 1st inst., passed Cape Race at six o'clock this morning.

The Australasian arrived at Liverpool on the 1st inst.

The United States gunboat Tuscarora has been ordered off the dock by the Government, and has taken its position near the Needles.

The rebel pirate Nashville is still in Southampton docks.

The reported naval engagement off Algiers is not confirmed.
