Officers with gold lace wound in astonishing involutions upon their arms, private soldiers in simple homespun, and civilians in broadcloth, all seem to drink whisky with persistent energy and perseverance. They drink it, too, in quantities which would astonish the nerves of a castiron lamp-post, and of a quality which would destroy the digestive powers of an ostritch. The fault that these are platted to commit havor among our men is chargeable to the civil administration, and the civil administration should be held responsible. The enormities—these red-curtained dens of vice-these back alley headache manufactories are set up under licenses granted through the mistaken idea of raising revenue.
