IMPORTANT MESSAGE OF THE

WASHINGTON, March 6.

The bill reported from the committee of Ways and Means to-day authorizing the pur-chase of coin, and for other purposes, provides that the Secretary of the Treasury may dispose of any bonds or notes bearing interest authorized by law for coin, at such rates and upon such terms as he may deem most advantageous ized by the act to authorize the Secretary of the Treasury to issue certificates of indebtedness to public creditors, approved March 1st, 1862, ing officers, upon sums placed to their credit on the books of the treasurer upon requisitions of the proper department as well in discharge of audited and settled accounts as provided by the said act. It is further provided that the demand notes authorized by act of July 17th, 1861, and by the act of February 12th, 1861, shall be receivable, and shall be lawful money and legal tender in like manner, and to the same extent as the notes authorized by the act to authorize the lasue of United States notes, and for the redemption or funding thereof, and for funding the floating debt of the United States, approved 28th last month.

Such a proposition on the part of the general government sets up no claim of a right by Federal authority to interfere with slavery within State limits, referring as it does the absolute control of the subject in each case to the State and its people immedia tely interested, it is proposed as a matter of

perfectly tree choice with them. In the annual message last December, I thought fit to say the Union must be preserved, and hence all indispensable means m employed I said this not hastily, but deliberately. War has been made, and continues to be an indispensable means to this end. A practical re-acknowledgment of the national authority would render the war unnecessary, and it would at once cease. If, however, resistance continues the war must also continue, and it is impossible to forese all the incidents which may attend and all the ruin which may follow it. Such as may seem indispensable or may obviously promise great efficiency towards ending the struggle must and will come. The proposition now made is an offer only. I hope it may be esteemed no offence to ask whether the pecuniary considera-tion tendered would not be of more value to the States and private persons and property in

them, than in the present aspect of affairs. While it is true that the adoption of the proposed resolution would be merely initiatory and not within itself a practical measure, it is recommended in the hope that it would soon
