By this table it appears that in the Senate there are 16 lawyers, 2 physicians, 4 farmers, 1 editor, 1 blacksmith, 1 miller, 1 carpenter, 1 contractor, 1 clerk, 1 real estate dealer, 1 merchant and 1 jeweller. The oldest man in the Senate is Dr. Crawford of Mifflin, being 68; the youngest is 29, Messrs. Bound and Gratz, both being set down at that age.

In the House, there are 28 lawyers, 20 farmers, 6 physicians, 10 merchants, 2 lumber merchants, 1 tavern and storekeeper, 1 dyer, 1 printer and editor, 1 lumberman, 1 cattle dealer, 1 lookuper, 1 merchant, 1 architect, 2 clerks, 2 printers, 3 shoemakers, 3 surveyors, 5 carpenters and builders, 1 bank note printer, 1 tradesman, 1 dentist, 1 cabinet maker, 1 iron master, 3 editors, 2 bankers, 1 insurance agent, 1 laborer, 1 harness maker, 1 clergyman, and 2 gentlemen.

The oldest man in the House, is Mr. Peters, of Lancaster, who is 70; the youngest is Mr. Quirey, of Philadelphia, who is 29. The average age of the members of the House, is 40 years, and the average age of Senators, 35.

In religion, there is a great variety, being in the House, 2 Baptists, 24 Presbyterians, 2 Congregationalists, 9 Episcopal Methodists, 5 Episcopalians, 3 Friends (or Quakers), 2 United Presbyterians, 6 Catholics, 6 German Reformed, 1 Disciple, 1 Protestant Methodist, 4 Lutherans, 1 Reform Presbyterian, 1 Church of God, (Winebrenerian), 1 Free Thinker, 1 Christian and 31 making no profession.

In the Senate, there are 3 Episcopalians, 1 Unitarian, 5 Presbyterians, 1 United Presbyterian, 1 Friend, 3 Methodists, 1 Catholic, 1 German Reform, 1 Dutch Reform and 14 who make no profession.

Of the members of the House, 79 are natives of Pennsylvania, 1 of Massachusetts, 7 of New York, 2 of Ohio, 2 of Connecticut, 1 of Maryland, 1 of Rhode Island, 1 of Ireland, 1 of England, and 1 of New Jersey.

Of the Senate, 29 are natives of Pennsylvania, 2 of Ohio, 1 of New Jersey, and 1 of Ireland. In both Houses there are 95 professors of religion, and 35 who make no profession; and, according to these statistics, it should be a remarkably honest, upright and pious assembly.
