



THE REMAINS OF COL. JAMES CAMERON, late ommander of the gallant 79th New York Highlanders, arrived here by a special train from Baltimore at 8 o'clock last evening, accompanied by an escort of the 54th regiment of Pennsylvania volunteers, under the command of Major J.C.Kretschman of the 108d regiment, MARKET STREET New York volunteers, who were detailed for

that purpose. The remains of the lamented Colonel were recovered by Major A. V. Elliott and Mr. John Keens, of the War Department, and the Orderly Sergeant of the late Colonel Cameron. who started from Washington for Manassas imme liately after its evacuation by the rebels. When they reached the old buttle ground, they were led to the spot by a colored man in the neighborhood

The body had been buried with five other without a coffin. It was easily recognized by certain marks, as the clothing was to a great ex tent entire. The hair was almost perfect, although the flesh had almost entirely decayed from the bones. A truss of a peculiar construction, which the Colonel wore, was also found in its proper place on his remains.

The corpse was taken to Washington, where splendid coffin was awaiting it. Early yes terday morning the Fifty-fourth, Pennsylvania volunteers, Colonel J. M. Campbell, escorted the remains through that city to the depot from thence the body was conveyed via Baltimore to this city last night, as stated. The corpse only remained here a short time, and was forwarded to Lewisburg, Union county, accompanied by its military escort, and a number of the relatives and friends of the deceased of this city.
