The Judiciary Committee of the House on the Censorship of the Press.

Washington, March 20. The House Committee on the Judiciary in their report, made to-day, on the censorship of s, say that the telegraph has become a most important auxiliary to the press of the country, and should be left as free from Government interference as may be consistent with the necessities of the Government in time of war. These necessities cannot extend beyond what may be legitimately connected with the military or naval affairs of the nation, and to these should the Government interference with the transmission of intelligence be confined, for it is this character of information alone which can be of importance to the enemy, and which may be properly withheld from the press and the public, in order that it may not reach the my. The committee therefore recommend Gold and Silver Pencil and Pen the adoption of the following resolutions by

**Resolved, That the government should not in terfere with the free transmission of intelli gence by telegraph, when the same will not aid the enemy in his military or naval operations, or give him information concerning such operaons on the part of the Government, except when it may become necessary for the Government, under the authority of Congress, to as sume the exclusive control of the telegraph for its own legitimate purposes, or to assert the right of priority in the transmission of its own
