THE REMAINS OF PAYMASTER CHAS. E. HAMM.—Who died on board the U. ANOTHER GREAT GUN.—A rifled gun of immense size, and through here yesterday from Perryville to Washington. It was made from the regular ten inch columbiad pattern and is eight inches bore. The gun is consequently heavier than the regular ten inch columbiad, we believe, over eight tons. The rifling was performed in the most satisfactory manner, and the gun is said to be the best finished piece of ordnance yet turned out at the works. It will throw an immense projectile calculated to change any armor on which the ball will strike at right angles.

REAR WATERS.—The Middletown Journal says that on Saturday morning, the Swatara connected to raise rapidly, and by Sunday morning it was bank full, and overflowing at some places. The current became very strong, and for a time threatened all the timber rafts between the Susquehanna and railroad bridge. The lumbermen, however, succeeded in getting the rafts all properly secured in good time, and consequently no loss was sustained. The Susquehanna also got on a regular old fashioned "swell," and is still quite high. We understand several rafts are now on the way down, and in a few days we may expect a brisk time along the Susquehanna. Lumber and timber are selling pretty fair prices.

ARREST OF A WATCH THIEF.—On Tuesday last Mr. Zimmerman, Jeweller, Market street, missed a valuable gold watch from his store, and had reason to suspect a man wearing the uniform of a soldier, who had been in his establishment a short time previous, as the person who purloined it. In the meantime, notification of the robbery, with a description of the alleged thief, was sent by magnetic telegraph to the police authorities of Reading and Lancaster, and yesterday a dispatch was received in return from the former city, announcing that a man answering the given description was arrested there on Wednesday, with the stolen watch in his possession. Officer Campbell left for Reading yesterday morning.

DANGEROUS COUNTERFEIT.—Thompson's Bank Note Reporter, for March 1st, warns the public against the ingenious and very dangerous counterfeit ten dollar gold pieces, which are circulated extensively, and almost defy detection from an expert. The genuine coin is opened, fully one half the gold taken out, then filled in with platinum, or some other equally heavy substance, and then closed up; the coin itself to all appearances, remaining the same.
