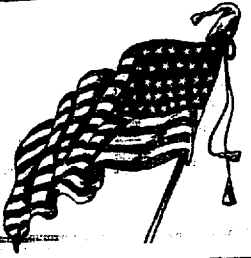

THE NATIONAL FOUNDRY.

By the proceedings of Congress yesterday, we notice that the subject of the National Foundry was up in the Senate, and that the debate on the question elicited the fact that Pennsylvania was in reality the proper locality for such an establishment.

THE DIFFERENCE.

One year ago the display of the Stars and Stripes was the signal of a man's loyalty and the evidence that he disapproved the hot-headed rebellion of the slave drivers.

CONGRESS is delaying action on the subject of emancipation, as provided for by the President's resolution, in the District of Columbia, where of all other localities, the pest of slavery should be abolished.

TAXATION has been proposed on so many different elements of labor and articles of produce and business, that a contemporary aptly asks, "Why are Banks exempted from a tax on their small note issues, which have succeeded in driving gold and silver out of circulation?"

THE MANAGEMENT OF THE NORTHERN CENTRAL RAILROAD AND THE CITY COUNCILS OF BALTIMORE.

We have no disposition to interfere with the internal differences of any corporation, or take part in any quarrel which does not particularly interest ourselves or the public at large.

THE report of that committee made some week ago, is a clear, concise and convincing vindication, not only of the present management of the road, but of those who thus attempted to bring the enterprise into disgrace in the plight of being clearly guilty, first, of the cause of the embarrassments of the road when they did exist; and, second, of conspiracy again to create embarrassment, after the road had been placed in a condition to pay its debts, repair its works, and extend its lines.

SENATOR COWAN, according to a statement made by E. W. Capron, assistant clerk of the House of Representatives, and editor of the Chester County Times, has written letters to this city, urging the Legislature to pass a resolution instructing him to vote for the repeal of slavery in the District of Columbia.

DEMOCRATIC PRINCIPLES.

We hear a great deal said at the present time about Democratic principles, but we have as yet seen no statement of what those principles are supposed to embody, and what application is proposed to be made of them in the existing crisis.

WE WOULD LIKE to see an inventory of the arms, stores, &c. captured from the rebels during the past six weeks, "stocked up" into one aggregated whole: They would make an imposing array. We must have taken at least fifty thousand stand of small arms, three or four hundred pieces of artillery, thirty or forty thousand tents, several thousand horses, wagons, &c.

Thanks to the laudable genius of Floyd, the rebels commenced business with a good stock of implements of war on hand; but what between wear and tear, and what we have recovered of this stolen plunder, is not the stock beginning to run low? The rebels can't be doing a great deal in the way of manufacturing arms just now.

THE DABOLOS OF THE SLAVERY QUESTION.—The Pittsburg Courier, in an article in this week's issue, takes decided ground on the slavery question. We believe there is no constitutional difficulty in the way of such a measure. If it can be done without infringing on the constitutional rights of Spenserians, it ought to be done."

ARMSTRONG GUNS.

WASHINGTON, March 22. Lieut. Worden, the gallant commander of the Monitor, is improving. He slept well last night for the first time since his injury, and his friends are now confident that he will completely recover his eyesight.

We are assured from a perfectly reliable source that there is not an Armstrong gun in this country, nor has Sir William Armstrong ever made a gun for any other service than that of the English government. The large rifled ordnance procured from England by the rebels, were made at the Lowmoor works, after the designs of Capt. Blakey, formerly of the royal artillery.

STILL FURTHER CONFIRMATION OF THE CAPTURE OF YANGRY.

HE IS CONFINED IN A CABOOSE AT KEY WEST.

EASTON, Pa., March 22. B. S. Kellogg, of the St. Charles Hotel, Scranton, has received a letter from an officer of the 4th regiment, P. V., dated Key West, March 10th, in which he says "a prize arrived here last evening, captured in a trying to pass the blockade. Her sailors were taken to jail, and one among them, to whom the attention of the officers was directed by the whiteness of his hands, was examined and identified by several of our officers to be the famous scoundrel, W. J. Hancock. A news correspondent also knows him. He is confined in the caboose here."

The Fifty-first Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteers, under the command of Colonel J. F. Hartnuff, has behaved with distinguished gallantry at Roanoke Island and at Newbern.

In the latter engagement they stormed the enemy's batteries at the point of the bayonet and were the first to plant our flag on their entrenchments.

The honor which they have thus won for the Commonwealth and themselves ought to be held in remembrance.

It is therefore ordered that "Roanoke Island, 21st February, 1862," and "Newbern, 14th March, 1862," be inscribed on the flag of the regiment.
